Message from the Headmaster

Dear Parent/Carer

We welcome back all members of our school community for another academic year. Hopefully it has been a good summer for all our pupils and we are now ready for the various challenges that a new year will bring. We obviously extend a special welcome to our new Year 7 boys and Lower Sixth students, all of whom are embarking on the journey through Beechen Cliff, one which will hopefully see them achieving their ambitions.

The outcomes from GCES and A Level examinations are very strong, indicating again that the quality of teaching, combined with the determination of pupils and supportive parents, brings about academic results. At GCSE 84% of the Year 11 boys achieved the "benchmark" five high grade passes including English and Mathematics. To put this into some context I have included a chart below which shows our achievements over the last four years of GCSE, indicating the results of boys nationally. It makes for an interesting comparison.

The second measure of GCSE success is the "E Bacc achievement" indicating the percentage of boys achieving five good passes including English, Mathematics, Science, a Humanities subject and a Modern Foreign Language. For the second year running 51% of Beechen Cliff boys achieved this benchmark. Again, the charts below will put this into some context. Although the national data for this year has not yet been validated, we believe that the progress made by boys across the school has put them in the top 20% of all schools for their progress from their starting point in Year 7. Clearly the greatest value for each boy is making or exceeding his targets so that he has positive options for the future. For many, this includes moving into the Beechen Cliff Sixth Form and continuing with A Level courses. For others, apprenticeships and study at other settings will await. We hope that they will take with them good memories and long-lasting friendships.

At A'level we saw our students achieve some wonderful successes. Twenty students achieved 3 or more A grades (eighteen with * grades) and 136 students have won places at university. Six students have been able to take up their places at Oxbridge or onto Medicine courses and these achievements once again reflect the efforts of staff, students and often anxious parents in bringing their school lives to successful conclusion.





New Behaviour and Sanctions System

The 'Consequences' and 'Work Room' system will be used when a student's behaviour is such that it interferes with the learning of others and the student has not responded to any behaviour correction prompts from the teacher. Initial poor behaviour in the classroom will be responded to by warning a student of the consequences if their poor behaviour continues. If this fails to bring about an improvement in behaviour, use of the "Consequence" will be used to deal with disruptions in the classroom. The system is consistent across the school and gives students the opportunity to reflect on their actions and change their behaviour.

C1	Verbal warning recorded on board
C2	Final verbal warning recorded on board - detention for 20 minutes
C3	Student will be removed from the lesson and sent to the workroom
C3+	Failure to attend either C2 or C3 detention. Gross defiance
C4	Severe or persistent unacceptable behaviour

 A student who is rude, shouts out, disobeys instructions or behaves inappropriately will be issued with a <u>first warning</u> - Consequence One (C1) by the class teacher or support staff. These verbal warnings are not to be centrally recorded but should be noted by the class teacher e.g. on the board, in notebook etc. Examples of where a C1 can be communicated to a student are; Rudeness e.g. talking back to a teacher or other adult, talking whilst teacher is talking, making comments to other pupils which cause them to react Shouting out Disobeying instructions of a teacher or other adult Behaving inappropriately e.g. moving around without permission
 If a student persists in being rude, shouts out, disobeys instructions or behaves inappropriately then a <u>final warning</u> is issued, and a tick is made against their name on the board (if in class) and they will receive a detention. C2 detentions can also be issued for misbehaviour around school. Examples of where a C2 can be enforced are; Anti-social behaviour Inappropriate comments to a member of staff Unjustified lateness Poor use of language Defiance

	 Wearing trainers or sports kit around school A detention will be issued on the same day for 20 minutes after school.
C3 Workroom	If a student does not meet the expectations for a <u>third time</u> they will be removed from the lesson and sent to the workroom for the remainder of that lesson.
	Students will receive a C2 detention and a 30 minute faculty (days will vary depending on the faculty)
C3+	If a student fails to attend a C2 or C3 detention or exhibits unacceptable behaviour to and from school or extreme misbehaviour around school.
	Students will receive a Headmaster's Friday Detention (1 hour) and a letter will be sent home to notify parents/carers. Behaviour will b investigated and monitored by HoH/SMT.
C4	A C4 could be given due to an escalation of
Saturday	warnings, (C2, C3 etc.) or may jump straight to
Detention	this category due to the severity of the incident.
Isolation	Automatic C4 around the school or in class

It is clear that our pupils have grown over the summer. If you have any spare uniform items which can be donated to our second-hand uniform stocks, could you please send in to the main school office.



Accelerated Reader launch - STAR Tests to start in lessons next week

All Year 7s and 8s will take part in the Accelerated Reader reading scheme, now in its third year of running here. More information will follow in due course, with pupils having an introductory assembly, and with a more detailed explanation to be presented to parents at the Year 7 Information Evening in November. For now, pupils may wish to be aware that they will take the first of three 'STAR Tests' in one of their English lessons next week, although this is not a test in the true sense of the word and is certainly not anything they need prepare for.

Reading Books

Furthermore, Year 7s and 8s are kindly reminded that they are expected to have a reading book in their bag at all times, and that many lessons – not just English! –may well involve periods of silent, independent reading. An incentive may be skipping the lunch queue if they are the first to produce their reading book at that day's spot check...

Once Accelerated Reader has been launched in your son's lesson he will be given more guidance as to what he might like to read next. In the meantime, please help him to ensure he has a book of his choice from home (no magazines, please).
