Message from the Headmaster

Dear Parent/Carer

Examination Results and School Performance Tables

You will have read about the exceptional GCSE results achieved by our Year 11 pupils this summer. 85% achieved at least a standard pass (previously grade C, now a grade 4) in both English and Mathematics. Further, 51% achieved the English Baccalaureate. Both these are well in excess of the national average, particularly for boys, and are testament to the hard work of pupils and teaching staff alike.

DfE School Performance Tables will soon be published but these will not reflect our results. This is due to the fact that, like many prestigious schools, we enter pupils for international GCSEs in English. From 2017 international GCSEs will no longer be included in Performance Tables.


At all times we make decisions on courses based on the best interests of our pupils rather than our position in the Performance Tables. 90% of our Year 11 pupils achieved a standard pass (grade C/grade 4) or above in English and we are delighted with their success.

Winter-Adjusted School Day to start after October Half Term

As you know Beechen Cliff has one of the most glorious aspects in Bath and during the warmer and drier months most of the boys enjoy make use of the upper and lower fields during breaks and lunchtimes. However in the wetter and colder months the boys are limited to small hard standing play areas and restricted inside spaces – both becoming crowded during lunchtimes. As a consequence many of the boys and staff have felt that during the winter our lunchtime is too long.

After consulting with stakeholders last year, we will introduce an adjusted school day during the winter to reduce the length of lunchtime. This will start after the October half term. Period 4 will become an hour and a half long to include a half hour lunch break. Different year groups will take the half hour lunch break at different times. The table below shows how this would work. This is a fairly common arrangement in other schools.

The end of the school day would therefore be brought forward by 20 minutes and finish at 3:05pm. The additional benefit of the earlier finish would allow for increased opportunity for after school sports training using natural light. **There is no change to the start of the school day.**

Our intention is to switch to the winter school day between the October half term and the February half term and then revert back to our existing day. Towards the end of the winter we will evaluate the effectiveness of this new arrangement.
