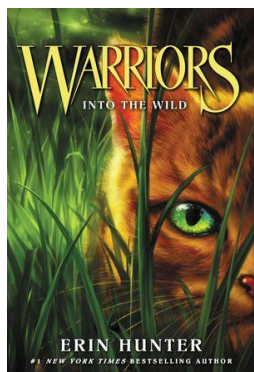

Theme of the Week

This week's Theme of the Week is about the UN International Day of Families. Although families all over the world have transformed greatly over the past decades in terms of their structure and as a result of global trends and demographic changes, the United Nations still recognizes the family as the basic unit of society. The International Day of Families provides an opportunity to promote awareness of issues relating to families and to increase knowledge of the social, economic and demographic processes affecting them. It has inspired a series of awareness-raising events, including national family days. In many countries, this day is an opportunity to highlight different areas of interest and importance to families.



In 1993, the General Assembly decided in a resolution that 15 May of every year should be observed as **The International Day of Families**. This day provides an opportunity to promote awareness of issues relating to families and to increase the knowledge of the social, economic and demographic processes affecting families. Activities include workshops and conferences, radio and television programmes, newspaper articles and cultural programmes highlighting relevant themes. On 25 September 2015, the 193 member states of the United Nations unanimously adopted the [Sustainable Development Goals](#), a set of 17 goals aiming to eliminate poverty, discrimination, abuse and preventable deaths, address environmental destruction, and usher in an era of development for all people, everywhere. Each goal has specific targets to be achieved over the next 15 years.

This year's observance of International Day of Families will explore the role of families and family policies in advancing [Sustainable Development Goal 16](#) in terms of promoting peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, the provision of access to justice for all, and building effective, accountable institutions at all levels.

Part of the focus of International Day of Family is the recognition that families are structured differently around the world, but what unites them is an understanding and appreciation of the values and importance of family.

Attached to this newsletter is a powerpoint which explores the theme for this year's International Day of Families, and includes a link to a video called 'Love has no labels.' It is important to recognise that some people have difficult family lives, which can lead to problems with mental health. There is a slide signposting support with these issues - there is ALWAYS someone/somewhere to go for help, advice or support.
