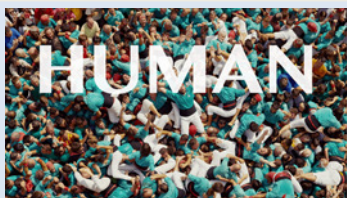

Theme of the Week

Theme of the week this week is about 'Human', a documentary exploring the concept of what it means to be human, and identifying what unites us with others around the world. It is also intended to encourage us to take some time to pause and reflect on our own lives in relation to others, and to appreciate the diversity of the world around us.



Human is a 2015 documentary by Frenchman Yann Arthus-Bertrand, a photographer, journalist, reporter and environmentalist. The film is almost entirely composed of exclusive aerial footage and first-person stories told into the camera. It was the first film to premiere in the General Assembly Hall of the United Nations, to an audience of 1,000 viewers.

From stories of everyday experiences to accounts of the most unbelievable lives, these poignant encounters share a rare sincerity and underline who we are – our darker side, but also what is most noble in us, and what is universal. Our Earth is shown at its most impressive through never-before-seen aerial images accompanied by soaring music, providing an opportunity to sit back and reflect.

Human comprises of interviews with more than 2000 people in 60 countries. Each person interviewed was asked the same set of forty questions and was presented on a plain black background without any musical score or any details about their identity and locale. Arthus-Bertrand hoped that removing personal identifiers would draw focus to our similarities, explaining that they "... wanted to concentrate on what we all share. If you put the name of a person, or what country they're from, you don't feel that as strongly."

The inspiration behind this project was a question Arthus-Bertrand could not find the answer to in any of his previous work: "I am one man among seven billion others. For the past 40 years, I have been photographing our planet and its human diversity, and I have the feeling that humanity is not making any progress. We can't always manage to live together. Why is that? I didn't look for an answer in statistics or analysis, but in man himself."

The film is intended to encourage thought and conversation about what makes us human, to recognise and celebrate both the similarities and the differences between people all over the world, and to reflect on the spectacular nature of the world around us. Hopefully this will encourage discussions in our tutor groups!

Be Tick aware

At this stage of the year through various outdoor activities many students will be in areas where they could pick up ticks. These insects are in great abundance this year. They are parasitic and take blood from their host. They are normally easy to remove with tweezers and are quite common. However they can carry Lyme disease, which if untreated is extremely de-habilitating. The incidence of this disease is on the rise so here is some advice on what to look out for.
