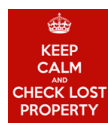

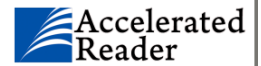
Lost Property

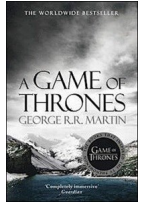


Reader of the Week
