A second textbook will be needed to support the second year of the A level course, this is currently Business 2 by Wolinski & Coates.

Up to date reading

Regular coverage of Business issues appears in broadsheet newspapers such as The Times, The Independent, Financial Times and The Guardian. The Sunday Times has a Business supplement that can be very useful as a weekly overview of current business news, with many articles that link to topics covered in the course.

- Research some aspect of the history of Spain or Latin America, which interests you.

- Find out a little bit about the main festivals and traditions in Spanish- speaking countries...you could start with the **La Tomatina, or Las Fallas**.
- Watch a **Guillermo del Toro** film – What do you like/dislike about it?
- Find a Spanish series on **Netflix** that interests you. There are lots to choose from – Siempre Bruja, La casa de papel,. There are also lots of documentaries – Nicky Jam -el ganador – or films.
