Dear Parents and Carers,

This week we have been talking about careers in assemblies and I have asked all pupils to talk to their parents or carers about careers and their thoughts about what jobs they might like to do in the future.

Following World Book Day, prizes have now been awarded to our Book Cover Competition winners. In first place was Adam in Year 7, in second place was Nicholas in Year 8 and in third place was Tom in Year 8. Their artwork will now be on display on book covers in the library.

HPV Vaccination—Catch up session

Dear Parent/Guardian

The School Aged Immunisation Team will be visiting your child's school in the next few weeks to deliver catch up HPV vaccinations to any **Year 10** children **where consent has previously been given** for this vaccination and are still due their first or second dose; we will use your existing consent to deliver this vaccination (this consent may have been given up to two years ago).

If you previously consented and no longer wish your child to receive this vaccination please call our team on **0300 247 0082** to withdraw your consent.

The consent link previously sent to your child's school is now closed so you will be unable to complete a new consent for your child to be vaccinated in school. If you have **not** previously completed an HPV consent form and would like your child to receive this vaccination, please call our designated team on **0300 247 0082** who will be happy to book your child into one of our local Community Clinics to receive their vaccination.

Alexandra Park/ Shakespeare Avenue - Road Closure for 2 weeks commencing 14th March 2022

Western Power works on electrical supply to Alexandra Park will commence w/c 14th March 2022. The works will require the park road and part of the public highway on Shakespeare Avenue to be closed for periods of time to allow the work to be completed safely. This will take up to 2 weeks.

Literacy Update

Following on from the success of 'World Book Day' we'd like to take the opportunity to remind parents that this year we hope more than ever to build a reading culture at Beechen Cliff which is second to none.

We have spent an enormous amount of time, energy and money promoting a love of reading over time and particularly in the last year. The one missing link for some children remains whether they have enough of a reading habit to get into reading; to get into a book. If they don't, our constant entusing will inevitably come to nothing. Our solution is to expect regularity from the children—a daily habit.

One of the ways we encourage this is through the use of a computer program called Accelerated Reader (AR). Some of you will already know about AR as the school introduced it in January 2015 for students in Key Stage 3. AR helps teachers manage and monitor children's independent reading practise. Your child picks a book at his own level and reads it at his own pace. When finished, your child takes a short quiz on the computer - passing the quiz is an indication that your child has understood what has been read. Teachers may assist children by:

- Guiding them to books appropriate to their ability and interests.
- Asking probing questions as your child reads and before quizzing.
- Pairing your child with our sixth form buddy programme, reading with or reading to your child.

To access this from home you simply need log in from RM Unify, click on the tile which says Accelerated Reader, then simply use your login details and password to access the quiz.

Year 7 - 30 minutes of reading twice weekly.

Year 8 - 45 minutes or more twice weekly.

We have lots of books that the children can choose from in school, however we are also aware that many children like to read their own books from home. You can visit the website www.arbookfind.co.uk to search all of the available books with AR quizzes to see if the book your child wants to read is on the scheme. The quizzes can also be completed from home.

As with anything, performance improves with practise and children who read at least 20 minutes a day with a 90% comprehension rate on the AR quizzes see the greatest gain. At school, we dedicate one reading lesson to independent reading weekly in year 7 and fortnightly in year 8 to support this.

At home, you can help by encouraging your child to read, discussing books with them, asking questions about what they have read and visiting your local library together. Together, we can help every child to be a successful reader!

7 Top Tips to Support Reading at Home

Shared reading is a great way to develop children's language and communication and to boost their reading skills. Regular reading routines can offer lots of opportunities for learning during school closures.

1 Concentrate on reading quality (it isn't all about reading lots!)



Don't worry too much about the 'what' and 'how' of reading each day. Books are great—but leaflets, comics, recipes and instructions on a webpage can all be great too. Following a recipe to make some cupcakes is valuable reading. Be on the lookout for reading, wherever it is!

2 Ask your child lots of questions



All reading matters. Shared reading is about 'reading with', not just 'reading to' (even for older children). So, ask lots of 'Wh' questions, such as Who? What? When? Where? Why? Try them when talking about books: for example, 'what do you think Harry is feeling?'

3 Ask your child to make predictions about what they have read



If it is a book, look at the front cover—or the last chapter—and talk about what might happen next. Look for clues in the book and be a reading detective! For example, 'can you see the bear on the front cover? Where do you think he will go?'

4 Ask your child to summarise what they have read



When you've finished reading, talk about what happened. Acting out the things that happened in the story or describing the big idea of a chapter is really fun and maximises learning. For example, 'can you remember all the things that happened on the bear hunt?'

5 Ask your child to write about what they have read



Write, or draw pictures, from anything you've read! Big writing and pictures are even more fun. For example, use an old roll of wallpaper to make a treasure map with clues from the stories you've read together.

6 Read and discuss reading with friends or family



Make books a part of the family. Encourage your child to share them with a relative or friend, over a video call. Laugh about them when you are making meals together. For example, 'I hope the tiger doesn't come to tea today!'

7 Maintain the motivation to read



Talk about the joy of reading whenever you can. Your child is on an amazing journey to becoming a reader. Put them in the driving seat and have fun on the way! For example, 'choose your favourite story for bedtime tonight.'

Year 8 Outward Bound Adventurous Activity in Wales - June 2022

We are pleased to offer an adventure activity over 2 days for year 8 pupils.

This will take place over a 2 week period in June. The intention is that 4 groups of 20 Year 8's will travel to Tir Y Cwm, the school outdoor activity facility in Wales. The adventure will consist of one day trekking across the Brecon Beacons with team building activities followed by an overnight stay at the hostel. The following day will be a canoeing adventure down the Wye in open Canadian canoes from Glasbury, before returning to school later that evening.

The minibuses will leave early on the first day from school and a packed lunch will be required. We will of course stop at the motorway services for a short comfort break and an evening meal, breakfast and lunch the next day will be provided. We will stop again at the motorway services on our return journey so students will require money to purchase a meal if required as we could return to school late evening.

Mental Health Assemblies next week

In assemblies next week, pupils will be hearing some mental health testimonies from Sixth Form students. Over the last 5 years, these personal testimonies have had an enormous impact on younger pupils opening up about their mental health. The assemblies are going to be held by year group and tailored to the age of the pupils. There will be follow up discussions in tutor time the day after the assembly. In the past, we have found pupils being more open at school, and at home, following the assemblies so we would encourage parents to have discussions next week about the assemblies. We have a wealth of support for pupils' mental health at school: over 90 staff have been trained in having Solution Focused conversations, we employ counsellors 5 days a week and we publicise where pupils can seek help within and beyond school (see attached poster). Mental Health and Wellbeing



Academic Stress and Pressure

Due to the pandemic, it has been a very long time since schools and students have been back in the swing of preparing for internal or public exams. Our school solution-focused practitioners, Tara Gretton and Susie Ingram, have been noticing that a lot of students are experiencing stress and feeling the pressure of academic validation in the lead up to internal exams, mocks and especially the GCSE and A' Levels. These students have not had the experience of sitting any formal exams and so there is a huge fear of the unknown alongside an accompanying fear of failure.

As a solution-focused school, our staff are supporting all students with their worries and helping them to appreciate that this is something that all students across the country and internationally are experiencing against the extra-ordinary backdrop of Covid-19. When students focus too much on their fears, we invite them to notice just how remarkable they have been to cope during the 2 years of lockdowns. We invite them to notice the strengths and resources that they drew upon during those unprecedented times and to be pleased to notice what skills they have developed that will help them to cope with any future times of uncertainty. As parents and carers, we encourage you to have similar conversations with your children.

Many young people will experience situations which they find difficult and sometimes they will need some help to see that there is a way to get past this. In our staff solution-focused training, we are encouraged to invite our young people to notice that no problem exists all of the time. Whilst it is important to listen and give validation that young people do have problems that can, at times, seem insurmountable, when we invite them to notice times (rare as these may seem) when the problem is not presenting, young people are more able to notice the times when things are better. We can help them notice times where they use their own strengths and resources to overcome things; by noticing 'What works' the young person is more likely to try to repeat their own coping strategies and to develop a personal toolkit to help them overcome their problems.
