Tis the season to be jolly" - and to be scammed!



A reminder to be extra vigilant at this time of year with emails and text messages with links. The current big hitter in terms of scams is an email or text that looks like it is from a "loved one" requesting that you buy vouchers online (Google pay etc).

If you get this kind of message and it looks legitimate, <u>contact the person involved directly</u> and check. Do not email as it could be that the email account is compromised, certainly do not reply to the email thinking it is from your loved one. (The email name displayed may not be the real email address).

Safety over the Christmas period

Online Safety

No doubt some of our students will have asked for some form of technology that links to the internet for Christmas, be it a new smartphone, tablet or games console.

While their device will provide them with hours of entertainment, it can also present new risks. Here are 4 steps you can take to make sure that young people are safer online over the Christmas period and beyond.

1. Remember to set up parental controls

Parental controls can be a great tool to help protect young people online, and should be installed on any new device that they use. Find out more <u>here</u>.

2. Start a conversation about communicating safely online

A new device enables young people to gain access to new communities through online gaming and social media. Make time to start a conversation with young people about how they use online technology and what it means to them. You can use this as a way to remind them of some key strategies for safer internet use, for example:

- Be careful with what they share, including images, videos and personal information.
- Take control of who sees what they post by using privacy settings.
- Be mindful of who they are chatting to and gaming with do they really know and trust them? If not, don't share personal details or agree to meet them in other online spaces.
- 3. Remind young people how to report anything worrying we recommend reporting to <u>CEOP</u>

Location Sharing

If you're wanting to keep tabs on where your child is, there are several phone apps that will help, including Life360, Apple's 'Find my' and 'Find my kids' on Android.

<u>Literacy - Building a reading culture at Beechen Cliff...</u>

A couple of hundred years ago they used to light beacons on the hilltops to send truly momentous news across the country, and if that practice still held then the dark of our most recent winter nights would have been lit from one end of Bath to the other this term after our numerous reading challenges, author visits and competitions. The efforts of our pupils has melded the magnificent with the merciless. Oh yes!

This term has ignited the fire for reading and our pupils have really invested time and effort to improve all their reading skills. As one of our year 8 pupils put it, 'Books have the power to transport us to new worlds and different times and I love that!'

Our mission

We want to instill a love of reading for all our pupils at Beechen Cliff and instill a 'can do' attitude when it comes to reading any book.

Reading in curriculum time

All our classes in KS3 (7,8,9) have been given a class reader. In Years 7, 8 and 9 reading is timetabled as part of the curriculum. In Year 7 pupils have two hours of reading per fortnight and in Year 8 and 9 pupils have one hour of reading per fortnight. In addition for pupils in Years 7, 8 and 9 a weekly reading homework is part of the homework timetable.

Across both KS3 and KS4 vocabulary is focused on in every lesson with key words displayed and referred to as part of the whole school teaching policy. Teaching reading and developing vocabulary is seen as part of the responsibility of all teaching staff.

Accelerated Reader Quizzes

AR quizzes are now available to complete for all Y7/Y8 pupils. In short, once a book has been read they can take the quiz on our Accelerated Reader programme, pass the quiz and the number of words are added to your profile. Reach 100,000 words or more and you will receive a beautiful print of one of Mr Hacketts excellent hand drawn certificates (see below) with your name on it! You will also receive a prize if you are in the top three at the end of this term! Get reading as you have until Christmas to participate!

Languages




During the same week our senior linguists Stirling Smith and Vita Wall presented a special assembly to all the pupils to celebrate the importance of Languages which was well received by the pupils.

Extra Curricular highlights Terms 1 and 2

It has been a busy two terms with a vast array of events taking place after school and on weekends.

Here's a taste of just the sport for term 2 - 6 sports, 21 different teams and 115 fixtures that have taken place! That's an amazing effort from both pupils and staff and testimony to our belief of getting as many pupils as possible involved in as many different activities as possible. 4 football teams remain in the last 32 of the English Schools Cup and our ACE rugby team were narrowly defeated in the final of the ACE league by Hartpury.

In addition nearly all Year 7 pupils have visited Tir-y-Cwm, and Duke of Edinburgh Award participation numbers are high with 90 currently completing Bronze, 30 Silver and 15 Gold. Also, 30 pupils took park in our piano concert last term and we had a really successful variety show, Beechen Cliff's Got Talent a few weeks ago with 20 students involved in production, staging and performance. In Computer Science over 350 pupils completed the Bebras Challenge.

Add to this the 350 Year 7 pupils that have taken part in the Bath Hub trip to Legoland, 100 Year 10 pupils who have been to Thorpe Park, nearly 900 Year 8, 9, 10 and 11 pupils who have been ice skating as a Bath Hub group and you get a taste of the participation levels....and we have only just completed 2 terms!

To cap this term off, we have 59 Year 10 and Year 12 students off to the slopes for the annual Austria ski trip.

Looking ahead to term 3, we are straight back into it with 90 Year 7 pupils continuing in the Christmas spirit with a visit to the panto at the Theatre Royal.

A list of all clubs and societies will be available at the start of term 3. In the meantime, it's a good time to catch our breath! A heartfelt thanks to all the staff who have made these opportunities available and a massive well done to all the pupils who have taken advantage of these opportunities to enrich their experience of school life.

U14 Rugby - End of Season Report

The U14's have played expansive rugby this season focusing on big ball carries and offloads with supporting players either side ready to outsprint the defence and even making the referees struggle to keep up. The defensive work can't be forgotten either. To date, the A's have only **conceded 26 points** all season and **scored 175 points** in the 7 games played currently undefeated this season.



This season has seen **61** Year 9 boys represent Beechen Cliff. Our B team recorded excellent wins against KES (29-0) and Byranston School (40-7). The strength and depth of the U14 rugby squad provides strong competition internally, with boys continuously improving and pushing each other to be the best they can be.

After beating Wellsway (34-7) in the regional cup earlier in the season, it was planned that they play Heathfield School in what turned out to be the quarter final. The match didn't go ahead, but Heathfield gave them a walkover which means they are **through to the semi-final after Christmas!**





SENIOR RUGBY SUMMARY – 2022 SEASON

Beechen Cliff's 1st XV had another high quality season competing in the RFU's National ACE League. The league, which comprises the best 14 schools or colleges from all over the country who are affiliated, like we are, to a Premiership club, is arguably the highest standard of schoolboy rugby available. After a challenging set of fixtures in the League, which sends us all around England, we qualified for the ACE Final. Sadly we fell at this final hurdle losing out to reigning champions Hartpury (Match report separate)

In our early fixtures we got off to a great start (thanks to a very productive but gruelling pre-season training camp at Tir y Cwm),

ACE Rugby Report

Beechen Cliff came up just short in their season-long campaign to be crowned 2022 ACE League Champions. In a tight game against reigning champions Hartpury College, the Bath Rugby partner school lost 24-12 at Cheltenham Tigers RFC. The RFU ACE League pits the partner state schools or colleges of all the Premiership clubs against each other in a National League. Hartpury College are affiliated to Gloucester Rugby.

Beechen Cliff started very slowly and in the first 20 minutes were totally dominated by their physical opponents. Hartpury identified and exploited a weakness in Beechen Cliff's defensive organisation around the fringes of the breakdown and made repeated line-breaks through this area. They scored three unanswered tries in this opening period and all early signs indicated that Beechen Cliff were heading for an embarrassingly heavy defeat.


To their huge credit, Beechen Cliff resolved their problems, tightened up their defence and ramped up their physicality. Slowly they fought their way back into the game and were rewarded with a great team try, finished off by winger Henry Bartlett in the right corner.

In the second half Beechen Cliff continued to exert pressure and create chances, playing the same brand of exciting attacking rugby that had earned them their spot in the Final. From one such attack, Connor Treacey scored under the posts, having chased a clever kick from his back-row colleague Kacey Pike. Raff Weston converted. At 19-12, Beechen Cliff threw everything at the Hartpury defence and were so close on a number of occasions, but the defence held firm. Frustratingly, Hartpury scored themselves in the dying minutes of the game to extend their lead to 24-12.



At the final whistle the Beechen team were understandably devastated. Having won the final 60 minutes of the game 12-5, there was huge frustration at having underperformed in the opening quarter, giving Hartpury what proved to be a match winning lead. But the team, and wider squad of players, can be rightly proud of their achievement this season, finishing second in a tough League of 14 teams of exceptional quality. Many of the squad are U17s, and so will get another opportunity next year. The U18s will move on to the next stage of their rugby journey, most likely University BUCS Super League rugby, in the knowledge that they have had the best possible preparation. The school would like to thank them for their incredible commitment and service to the school - we are very proud of them.

Just because it's Christmas, it doesn't mean caring for your mental health has to be put on hold.

"It's the most wonderful time of the year!" is what I hear constantly at Christmas. Whether it's on the radio, the telly or out in public, we are constantly told that Christmas is a time to be happy.

But what if you're not happy?

The reality for many of us, including myself, is that when Christmas comes around, there's constant pressure on those with mental health problems to be happy all the time. But of course, that's easier said than done.

Here's my advice on things you can do to ensure you still enjoy the festive period this year, but also look after your mental health.

Take time out for yourself

It's so important to take time out every day, not just in the festive period. If you feel yourself getting a bit overwhelmed or upset, take five to ten minutes away from everyone on Christmas Day. Just have a bit of time to yourself.

Usually I will go into my bedroom to watch something on television, and this year I started running, so will absolutely take some time out on Christmas Day to go for a run. Christmas Day can be quite an overwhelming day, so allow yourself time to recharge.

If you feel yourself getting a bit overwhelmed or upset, take five to ten minutes away from everyone on Christmas Day.

Get back into your sleep routine

A good night's <u>sleep</u> is so important when it comes to looking after your mental health. It's said that teenagers need an average of nine-and-a-half hours' sleep each night. When it comes to the festive period, ensuring you get enough sleep can become difficult due to things like late nights at home and parties.

To make sure you get back into your normal sleeping routine easily, try going to bed at normal times as the festive period draws to a close. This'll make getting up for school a lot easier and, in turn, will help your mental health a lot.

Exercise for your wellbeing

Physical activity releases a chemical called endorphins, which makes you feel good, so if you're feeling a bit overwhelmed or low at Christmas, why not go out for a walk? You could go on your own or with someone else, or go for a bike ride or even a run.

You're allowed to take breaks, and do things that perhaps don't involve the whole family.

Try to relax

It's easy for me to say "Christmas is fun - just relax", but the reality is that relaxing can be tricky. Try doing things like yoga, breathing exercises or meditation to help you calm down if you're feeling a bit stressed over the festive period.

GCHQ Christmas Challenge

Every year, GCHQ publishes a Christmas Card on behalf of GCHQ Director, Sir Jeremy Fleming. The card traditionally includes a puzzle, as a bit of festive fun, and as a nod to our work, which famously revolves around codes, ciphers and communications. In 2021, for the first time, the Christmas card was designed specifically for children aged 11-18yrs old and became the GCHQ Christmas Challenge. It was so successful that we're bringing it back for 2022.

Once again, the Challenge is packed full of puzzles for 11 to 18-year-olds. The brainteasers are based on the seven disciplines of languages, engineering, codebreaking, analysis, maths, coding and cyber security - all key skills needed at GCHQ to help keep the country safe. But this year's challenge comes with a twist...once they solve all seven puzzles, your students will need to think outside the box, using the design on the front of the card to assemble the answers, forming three separate What3Words locations. Joining the three placenames together will reveal a hidden seasonal message.

From Wednesday 14 December, your mission, should you choose to accept it, is to crack all the puzzles to uncover the hidden festive message.
