Key Notices

Stranger Awareness

We have recently been informed that students were approached after school by a stranger who behaved in a threatening manner and invited boys to go to his home to 'play'. Please speak with your child about the importance of **stranger awareness** and how to keep themselves safe if approached by a stranger.

In line with latest Safeguarding advice, we no longer teach blanket 'stranger danger' messages to students. The reason for this is that sometimes a stranger is the only person who can help us and is a far safer option than not talking to anyone. E.g. a child lost in a shop is far safer to tell a stranger they are lost than to wander off looking for the person they have separated from. We may choose to discuss the likely 'safest' strangers in such scenarios such as a mother with a pram or small children or someone who works in the shop.

However, we do need to clarify the stranger issue as plainly there are situations we may want to warn children about for their own safety e.g.

- Never to get in a car with anyone (NOT just someone they don't know) unless their parent/guardian knows who/ where/ when etc and has given permission.
- Never leaving school with someone other than who they were expecting unless their parent/guardian knows who/ where/ when etc and has given permission and they have checked with a school staff member.
- Not to walk off with anyone (NOT just someone they don't know) unless their parent/guardian knows who/ where/ when etc and has given permission
- If someone tries to grab them it is ok to break all the rules of politeness to others e.g. scream, kick, punch, bite etc. Whatever they need to do to draw attention to themselves and alert others to the fact they are in danger.

Please reinforce these safety messages without giving them the idea that ALL strangers are 'bad'. Also be advised that there are always staff in school until at least 6pm and that they can return into the safety of the school if ever approached near to the school.

In addition we have also passed the information to all tutors to discuss with their tutees

C2 Slips

Dear Parents and Carers

We have made some slight alterations to our sanctions system, full details of which will be published on our website in due course. However, please be aware that we have replaced the short 'C2 detention' with a C2 reflection slip.

If a student needs a C2 (usually for relatively minor offences such as a second warning for talking, lateness or inadequate work) they need to complete the reflection slip, detailing how this issue can be improved next time. They then return that slip to the member of staff in their own time within 24 hours. If they should fail to do so, this can then be escalated to a 30-minute 'C3' detention.

Holocaust Education Day

On Thursday 26th January Year 9 students will be off timetable in order to take part in Holocaust Education Day - this event will launch their Holocaust education taught through both History and RPE lessons this term, and also mark Holocaust Memorial Day. Pupils will have an introduction to the event from Mr Tobin and Ms Netto after tutor time, and then will take part in eight workshops throughout the day to learn about and reflect upon the Holocaust through different mediums; teachers from across different Faculties will deliver these workshops, which include:



- Following the journey of a Jewish family
- The Holocaust through literature
- An experience of liberation
- The genetics of racism
- Memorials in Berlin
- Art - wings and escape
- Migration after the Holocaust
- Global consequences of national conflicts

During period 5 pupils will come together as a year group to reflect on their day and take part in a session with Mr Tobin and Mr Sayers exploring the psychology of bystanders, the moral responsibility we have to uphold the values of equality, inclusion and diversity, and ask the question: the Holocaust - never again? During this session we will also launch a reflective project, more details of which will be shared with pupils via Google Classroom.

We feel it is important to mark Holocaust Memorial Day in this way, and know from previous years how much the pupils benefit from this focused time exploring the Holocaust in different ways. Students will follow the usual timings of the school day, and should wear uniform as usual. They won't need any books for that day, but should bring their pencil case and study planner as usual.

'the rights of citizens to political and social freedom and equality.'

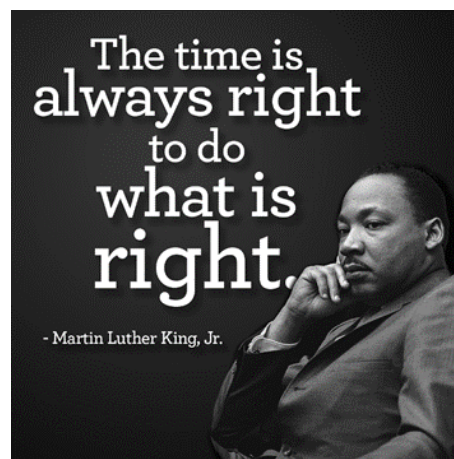
We know that not everyone in the world has their civil rights upheld - **can you think of any current or historical examples?**

Solution Focused Parent Training

Last Thursday evening we were thrilled to welcome so many parents to our online training where we gave an introduction to the Solution Focused (SF) approach that we use in 1:1 sessions with students at Beechen Cliff and huge numbers of trained Beechen Cliff staff volunteers also use too.

It was so lovely to meet parents of students from every year group and to hear how much you would like to have further training about how to use the Solution Focused approach in conversations with your own children.

A really interesting range of questions were raised for future training from: How to use SF if your child is feeling anxious to how to use SF to de-escalate a situation where emotions are running high.

Even if you did not manage to attend this training session, we would be interested to know from all parents/carers if you would be keen to attend further sessions and, if so, what topics you would be interested in learning about, using the SF approach.

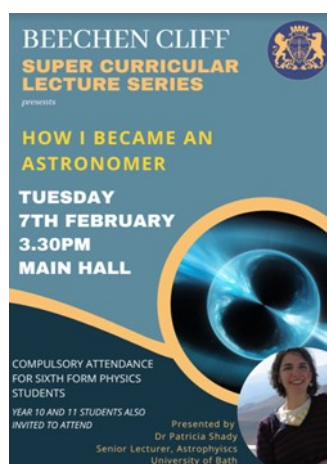
