Anti Idling Campaign

Drivers often idle their engines outside of schools, unaware of the harmful impacts to those around them. We are inviting you to get involved with an anti-idling campaign, 'Kick the Habit'. The campaign helps tackle toxic emissions by encouraging drivers to switch off their engines while waiting.

We are requesting that if you are in the vicinity of the school, to kindly turn your engine off while waiting. Help us to make a pledge to turn your engine off here www.bathnes.gov.uk/engineoff.

The 'Kick the Habit' campaign aims to:

- raise awareness of the dangers of idling engines
- encourage more people to switch off their engine while waiting
- highlight the benefits of driving more responsibly

Key messages

The impact of running engines whilst waiting:

- Contributes to air pollution affecting the health of those around you
- Particularly harmful for children and vulnerable people close to schools, nurseries, clinics and hospitals
- 36,000 deaths a year are estimated to be linked to air pollution
- Nitrogen dioxide pollution caused by vehicle emissions can worsen heart and lung conditions, reduce children's lung development and worsen asthma
- Costly wear and tear to your vehicle

The reasons why you don't need to keep your engine running:

- Modern batteries are more efficient and don't need to be running constantly to remain charged or use the radio
- Engines take a long time to cool down so will still send warm air through the heaters into the vehicle for a reasonable time
- You can idle your engine when defrosting your windscreen, but it's better for the environment to use a windscreen protector
- You can idle your engine if you are queuing in traffic, but if you are stationary for longer than 1 minute, you should turn off your engine.

Tutor Time Programme

The tutor time programme this week has been based around understanding Human Rights and British Values through our theme of the week sessions and House assemblies.

In addition Year 7 and 8 pupils have had assemblies on personal safety and knife crime following the same input to pupils in older year groups last week. We have wanted to strike a balance between honest information and reassurance for all our students in the wake of recent events, and have shared what the law says about knife crime, as well as sharing statistics on how rare it is for anyone to be involved with knives or violent crime. We have also ensured all our pupils know what to do if they are feeling concerned about this issue, whether that means talking through any anxieties with an appropriate adult, or using the Fearless anonymous reporting tool to inform police of any illegal activity.

Unlock Cyber Taster Day

On Friday 23rd June 24 year 8s with Ms Jarvis and Mr Quintin boarded a coach and set off to UWE for the Unlock Cyber Taster Day with other schools from around the Bristol and Bath area.


Different groups moved around various activities to learn more about cyber security and how to prevent breaches, such as hacking, malware and social engineering.





The "green" group in stream 1 visited the following activities:

- Think like a hacker run by Hargreaves Lansdown where they learnt some of the tricks and techniques that hackers use. They were also given an excellent goodie bag!
- A chance to be part of testing some eye tracking software designed by Airbus to identify social engineering techniques used by phishing emails.
- "Capture the flag" challenge where teams tested their skills by completing puzzles and cracking codes to find flags whilst supported by BT. Harrison excelled at this and gained the maximum number of points available to finish top of the leaderboard!
- The SW Regional Cyber Crime Unit taught the group about the Computer Misuse Act 1990 along
 with the fines and prison sentences you could expect if caught obtaining unauthorised access to
 computer systems.



Our other group was in stream 3 and learnt how to ethically hack with PWC, solved puzzles and controlled a drone to escape from a virtual escape room, played a capture the flag cyber game with Sage and were shown how hackers can target critical industrial systems, such as water and electricity, and how Atkins Global can "Defend the City".





Everyone came away from the taster day having learnt more about how cybercrime is having an effect on our lives and how we can implement different cybersecurity measures.

Be Tick aware

At this stage of the year through various outdoor activities many students will be in areas where they could pick up ticks. These insects are in great abundance this year. They are parasitic and take blood from their host. They are normally easy to remove with a tick remover and are quite common. However they can carry Lyme disease, which if untreated is extremely dehabilitating. The incidence of this disease is on the rise so here is some advice on what to look out for. If you remove a tick please keep an eye on the area and any of the symptoms below.

General Early Lyme disease Symptoms and Signs may include: Erythema Migrans (EM rash), the Bull's Eye rash (a subset of EM rash), or no rash.

The EM rash may appear on other places on your body than the bite site (Disseminated disease). It

may begin as a single circular red mark that spreads outwards. As it disseminates over the skin, sometimes it becomes lighter in the area nearer to the center of the bite--this central clearing is what distinguishes a Bull's eye rash from other EM rashes. In people of color, the rash may appear more like a bruise. The rash is usually not itchy. Since Lyme disease is a multi-systemic illness there are a multitude of Lyme disease symptoms including:

- Flu-like illness
- Fever
- History of Tick Bite (Not all patients recall a bite)
- Headache
- Extreme Fatigue
- EM Rash, Other Rashes (Only found in 50% of patients)
- Malar Flush, Red Ear Lobes
- TMJ/TMJD Jaw Pain (Temporomandibular joint dysfunction)
- Neck and Back Pain



The rash is very distinctive and looks like a target or dart board. Please consult your doctor if you see this.

On Friday morning (30th June), our newly appointed Sixth Form Mental Health Prefects – Olivia Bendry and Daisy Grimes, will join our Solution Focused Practitioners Tara Gretton and Susie Ingram to introduce themselves and run 4 separate student-led testimony assemblies for Years 7, 8, 9 and 10. Olivia and Daisy will introduce their Sixth Form Mental Health team and some of them will read out anonymous testimonies written by boys in the younger years about their personal struggles with their wellbeing and how getting support helped them.

We are keen to provide support to any pupil who is struggling, as early in their Beechen journey as possible. We believe that testimony assemblies are the most powerful way of encouraging our pupils and students to seek help.

Tara and Susie will introduce themselves and will explain a little about the Solution Focused Approach which they both use to support students and pupils at Beechen Cliff. Tara works mainly with the Lower School pupils and Susie works with the Sixth Formers.

We hope that the assembly will encourage more boys to seek help sooner if they are struggling or feel that they can talk to the older students who are part of the mental health team, as they will wear easily identifiable lanyards for the younger boys to see when they out and about around the school.







No, this is not sports coaching. Our focus will be on listening skills and asking effective questions which promote exploration of a topic and clarity of mind to allow for decision making.

Is this a parenting course by another name?

The ethos of coaching is that the person doing the thinking is robust enough to make progress and that the coach will listen and ask questions in order to support that thinking. This is not a parenting course but it can ease family life and allow for better conversations with your offspring.




