#### ECO GROUP-Year Review

In summary this year, the Eco group here at Beechen Cliff have managed to implement some positive changes to the school. With the help of Energy Sparks a charity that helps schools across the country access data about their energy usage and carbon footprint - using this data we have managed to have an automatic shutdown of the school computers at 5pm every day to help reduce our energy consumption. Furthermore we have secured a grant from the MNSP for LED lighting that can be installed across the school site.

We have also attended the youth climate conference 2023 at Haysfield where we were able to take inspiration from other schools and share our achievements.

In terms of sustainability, Beechen Cliff has used Banes Bikeability, a road cycling course for year 7. This will be repeated next academic year for Year 7 pupils as will the walk to school week. 




#### **Combined Cadet Force (CCF)**

This has been a busy year for the CCF as the contingent has returned to full strength following a couple of years disrupted by the after effects of Covid 19 restrictions. The Beechen Cliff boys are able to sample life in the CCF from the Summer Term of Year 8 and then decide if they would like to pursue a 'career' in the contingent, potentially rising to one of the NCO ranks.

The overall contingent strength in 2022-23 has been around 65, with 25 of the cadets being drawn from Beechen Cliff School. In 2023-24 the overall contingent strength is around 110, with Beechen Cliff contributing over 50 cadets. The attractions of life in the CCF are fairly clear to see and there is little doubt that the breadth of the syllabus, the opportunities provided for advancement and building of confidence are difficult to match in other areas of school life.











#### Key Events of 2022-23

The cadets attended their first significant exercise in October 2022, at Crowborough in Sussex. *Exercise First Chance* gives new recruits a chance to learn how to use all the kit that is provided, to camp in the field and to be given the rudimentary knowledge of fieldcraft and navigation that helps them 'get around' effectively.

In November the contingent represented both King Edward's School and Beechen Cliff through participation in the Remembrance Day parade in the City of Bath - an event which they remember for a long time and which gives them a chance to show their respect for those lost in conflict over the last century or more.

Following this there were Christmas party events and a Biennial Inspection to prepare for and the Beechen Cliff boys did exceptionally well in demonstrating their own skills and interest in the CCF through participation in command tasks, 'battle exercises', climbing wall challenges and ration pack cooking. The latter is always a firm favourite!

*Exercise Patch Up,* a 'real life' simulation of first aid emergencies, took place in February and this gave the boys the chance to earn one of the coveted First Aid badges which adorn the arms of many cadets.

In May 2023 the boys were taken to Portsmouth to tour the Royal Navy flagship, HMS Queen Elizabeth, being provided with lunch on board and even being able to sit in the Commander's seat on the bridge - very 'Star Trek' in terms of the technology on show.

A superb camp at Scraesdon Fort near Plymouth ( Exercise Next Step ) followed in late May.

The culmination of the year's activities saw the boys pit themselves against the elements in the Brecon Beacons, participating in an entirely tactical event, *Exercise Warrior Cadet*. This was the culmination of a year of training in a number of areas and their skills with the cadet weapon system, first aid, navigation, signals and camp creation (known as a 'harbour' in army parlance) came together in a non-stop package which left them exhausted but hopefully elated by what they learned about themselves.

This exercise is one which built resilience and really allowed the boys to 'dig deep' and discover that they were stronger and more determined than they ever thought possible. The same could be said to have gone for the staff.







For the new recruits May and June consisted of induction sessions (all CCF sessions are on a Wednesday afternoon from 4:00 - 6:00) which allowed them to get a feel for contingent life before committing to us.

In June and July the Year 8 CCF inductees had the opportunity to participate in the 'fun shoots' at Potterne - an experience detailed elsewhere in the newsletter. The year has been full of opportunity and personal development, something that each one of them can reflect on and use as experiences which will shape them, build their CVs and help them answer the inevitable interview question - 'Tell me about a time that you really had to push yourself'.

We now look forward to next term. In September the first exercise takes place and this is followed by the Remembrance event, the Annual Dinner/Ceilidh and the Christmas party in December. All of that before Christmas!

#### Interested Year 7 boys...

It might be worth thinking ahead at this point. Boys in Year 8 will receive an assembly in February which outlines the CCF and its activities, giving them the chance to book in for the induction programme which begins in April. The fact that the uniform and all kit is provided for nothing and the exercises are offered at a hugely subsidised rate by the army ( the average three day camp, including food and transport, coming in at £26 ) makes it a very attractive package for boys and parents. Any boy in receipt of the Pupil Premium receives this package at no cost or at a school subsidised rate. So, if you think your son might like to be a member of the King Edward's CCF contingent and be part of a great group of boys and girls, please look out for the notices next year or contact me using the email address below.

Although I am a member of the KES CCF I also act as the liaison between Beechen Cliff and King Edward's, making sure that parents have a point of contact in the school at all times.

#### Music

#### Potterne .22 Shooting

This shooting experience has been resurrected to provide an opportunity for Year 8 boys who have signed up to the CCF induction experience at King Edward's School.

The rifle range at Eastwell, near Potterne, plays host to an event which sees our boys use .22 semi-automatic rifles to take on a number of target challenges. Working in pairs, the boys take on 'The Pimpernel', an attempt to remove the scarlet dot in the middle of a small box at 25 metres. This is followed up by the old favourite 'Part the Hangman's Noose', an element that requires the shooters to cut through a thin wire from which is suspended a large skittle. Each pair gets two minutes to try and remove all five skittles using forty rounds. It gets quite exciting as the rounds progress and the competition hots up.

The next event, 'The Stake Shoot', involves the pairs having to shoot through a white line painted on an extended beam of wood, severing it completely to gain the points. 'Tin Can Alley' (you can probably work this one out yourself) comes next and the boys then have their group photograph and return to Bath.

The staff at the range have been delighted with the conduct and attitude of the boys and I am sure that this will remain the case for the last two shoots in July and the beginning of September.

#### **U12 Cricket Tour**

The Year 7 cricket squad toured Devon again this summer - for the 17th year. 16 boys accompanied by Mr Turner, Mr Thompson and Mr Ebdon left early on Thursday morning to travel to Exeter School in what would become the most successful tour we've ever had!

Traditionally, Exeter has always been our strongest opposition on this tour so it was some feat when we came out on top this year for only the second time EVER. We showed class with our batting setting a grand total of 167 in our 20 overs with our top four batters all retiring on 25 runs. This class continued through into our bowling after taking a couple of quick wickets helped put us well on the

front foot. Exeter started pulling the score back after one player retired on 25, but that was until

Freddie B got the ball in his hands. Bowling amazingly, he took an unbelievable 5-11 off of his 4 overs.

After a fantastic lunch laid on by our hosts, we set off to our next destination, Torquay

Boys Grammar School where we played an 8-aside tournament on Astroturf. The format was really interesting and set the boys lots of challenges

regarding scoring zones, running between the wickets, calling and close fielding. It was a very useful exercise and we took a lot of learning from it into our next games.

That evening we sat on the cliff tops at Babbacombe and ate our fish and chips before driving off to Exeter University to move into our overnight accommodation at their halls of residence.

The boys slept well and were up raring to go for day two. In the morning we filled our boots at the amazing all-you-can-eat breakfast bar before heading off to play the first game of Friday against QE Crediton at Sandford Cricket Club. Sandford was an amazing venue with a beautiful outlook, surrounding Parkland and a massive mansion. In a very tight encounter, it was good

to see another retirement while chasing our second T20 win of the tour, this time for Theo C this time on 30.

We then travelled back to Exeter University to play an internal indoor 8-a-side game in their state of the art cricket school in their sports park, this was very enjoyable and competitive and gave the boys experience of a game they never played before. After this it was good that we were able to book into one of the Uni's outdoor pools for an hour so the boys could chill out before going back to the accommodation.

We were up earlier on the last day as we needed to get to our last game for an earlier start. We played against Ipplepen Cricket

The few days were finished off with a visit to Dawlish Warren beach where the boys set up and ran their own game of beach cricket. Before we left the beach we had a brief awards ceremony where the Star of the tour was given out. This was given to Alfie H for his energy and quality all throughout the few days as well as his maturity on and most importantly off of the pitch. We hope they all really enjoyed the tour and learnt some valuable skills on and off of the cricket pitch.

#### 1st XI Cricket



#### Game #1: KES

After a gruelling ten weeks of early morning pre season sessions, it was finally time to try and put this practice to good use. The season got underway with what is always a feisty clash against our noisy neighbours, KES, in the Bath schools T20 cup competition. This year was no different, and it was vital to set the tone for the rest of the season, needing a solid performance to kick start our campaign as we looked to go one better than last seasons effort in the competition, in which we narrowly lost to Kingswood in the final.

Archie G and Harry L took to the middle in drizzling rain, but unfortunately weren't able to replicate some of their previous shotmaking in the nets for the previous ten weeks, which was also the case for the rest of the top order. Having found ourselves in quite some trouble early on, Fergal M and Fin R steadied the ship somewhat, as we posted a respectable 110 from our 20 overs.

With a challenging total to defend, it was essential to stay switched on in the field and peg KES back with wickets early on in their chase. However, the KES openers capitalised on the power play field restrictions, getting off to a rapid start as they used the pace on the ball from Dillon T and Joe H bowling to their advantage. Looking to bounce back from defeat to KES, we had a must-win game vs Prior Park as our final match of the group stage of the Bath schools T20 cup. Winning by a big enough margin was required to give us a chance of qualifying to the final, as well as other results to go in our favour.

Captain for the day Fergal M got off to the worst start possible by losing the toss, so we took to the field in conditions that seemed to favour the hosts who were batting first. Prior's openers were just finding their rhythm, until Joe H unleashed his first rocket of the afternoon, undoubtedly leaving a large bruise on the chest of one of the Prior batters. Off stumps at either end were peppered as George W, Freddie H, Joe H and Dillon T picked up all 10 wickets between them, as we dismissed Prior Park for just 97.

Once again, it was Archie G and Harry L who opened up, this time getting us off to a flier in the power play, partly thanks to some unorthodox field settings from the host's inexperienced skipper. The openers oozed class in every shot, and put on 84 runs for the first wicket, before Harry L, on 48, copped one on the pad that he claims was sliding down leg but given in an attempt to make the game more interesting. Archie G and Fergal M, ending on 38\* and 12\* respectively, saw the team home in this must-win cup game to an emphatic 9 wicket victory. This result was a statement of intent for how we wanted to perform for the rest of the season, but all we could do now in this competition was to keep our fingers crossed that other results went our way in order for us to qualify for the final.

#### Game #3: Monkton

Exam season was now fully underway for the year 11s and 13s, which meant some chopping and changing to the team from game to game. Fergal M's toss record became 0 from 2 as Monkton Combe strangely decided to put us into bat as the sun was beating down on this beautiful afternoon for cricket. The longer format meant that Fergal M opened the batting alongside Harry L, as the two batters strolled out to the middle with completely opposing mindsets. Fergal M took the shine off the new ball 54 times for his 26. Harry L meanwhile, was looking as majestic as ever before being struck on the pad on 54, and again had to wait for the ominous raise of the umpire's finger before walking back to the pavilion. Wickets tumbled before Archie G joined Dexter T at the crease and shared a scintillating 90 run partnership, with Dexter walloping the ball all around the ground (mostly beyond the rope) before giving his wicket away for 66 from just 37 balls. Archie G had been rotating the strike elegantly so that he could have a prime view of the action down the other end and wishing he was capable of doing the same, as he ended on 21\*. Unfortunately Fergal M had other ideas as he finally won the toss and we took to the field. The pink ball was flying in the early stages of Downside's innings, until Eric S got the eventual breakthrough thanks to Dexter T holding onto one at first slip. Dexter T then picked up two wickets with two toe-breaking yorkers, and a wicket each from Freddie H and Dillon T alongside some tight overs from Alex D on debut limited Downside to what felt like a competitive score of 150.

Harry L and Archie G went about the powerplay with standard procedure, making the most of the fielding side only being able to have two men outside the ring. Boundaries were flowing for both batsmen before Harry L got a thick outside edge down to deep third man as he departed for a quickfire 30 which included 7 fours. Fergal M and Dexter T both came and went, but it was Archie G who prevailed, despite having been checked for concussion after being struck on the helmet by a short ball, as he ended with a graceful 70\*. He and Ollie S saw us over the line with five overs to spare, as we romped home to an impressive seven wicket victory. While the top order made lightwork of this chase, it was certainly a needed experience to chase a larger total for the upcoming final of the Bath schools T20 cup against Kingswood. Stand-in skipper Fergal M maintains his 100% win record.

#### Game #5: Wycliffe

After a lengthy 2 week break, school cricket resumed with this highly anticipated 30 over fixture against Wycliffe, a team that we have beaten every year for the last 12 years. The overcast and damp conditions very much suited a bowl first, which led to the rest of the team baffled by Fergal's decision to bat having won the toss. Unfortunately we got off to what could only be described as a horror start, as we found ourselves 14-4 from 7 overs with three of these batters walking off without scoring. Archie G and Freddie H steadied the ship with a vital 70 run partnership, before both were tamely dismissed for 43 and 24 respectively. The tail did not wag, and we were bowled out for just 123, which was still a reasonable total to defend given the shambolic start to the innings.

We took to the field in search of early wickets. Unfortunately, none of these were found despite restricting Wycliffe to below the required run rate for the majority of their innings. Josh N got the eventual breakthrough and a couple of more wickets fell and suddenly we had a glimmer of hope. That was until Fergal M got chucked the ball to 'work his magic.' However, his magic turned out to consist of wides and boundaries, and some more wides. The game had now slipped away from us in addition to some simple errors in the field, and Wycliffe hit the winning runs with just ten balls to spare. A disappointing result, but still plenty of both positive and negative points to take away from it.

#### Game #6: Maggsy XI

The annual friendly against Maggsy XI had finally come around which presents a great opportunity to some lesser experienced players, a number of which were making their first team debut. Luckily, there was not a toss for Fergal M to either lose, or win but make another poor decision. The team settled into Hinton CCC's fancy new pavilion as we prepared to take to the field in what we knew could be a long time chasing leather until Maggsy declared, if we didn't pick up early and regular wickets.

Joe H and Christian L took the new ball with some tight overs to get things underway, which included brothers Fergal M and Rory M both spilling chances off Christian, but it was Mr Reliable Connor D who found the breakthrough. Three wickets apiece for Freddie H, who showcased his skill and control of the out swinger to perfection, and Arthur G, whose unpredictability between his googly and seam up proved too difficult to pick for the batsmen, came in the middle overs alongside very tidy spells from Charlie P and Alex D, with the latter taking his first of many wickets for the 1st XI. Fergal M and Christian L then saw off the rest of the tail, as we ended up bowling Maggsy XI out for 162.

After the eventual lunch break, Charlie P and Alex D got us on our way, playing sensibly while still rotating the strike, and each scored 21 before departing. Tom M looked solid with the bat on debut, but only managed 5 before chopping one onto his stumps. Fergal M decided to give some catching practice back to the bowler as he made it two ducks in two days, which brought another debutant in Max H to the crease. He had his eyes on a draw, as he faced 27 balls for his 7 runs. His dismissal was very quickly followed by Rory M, as he too departed without scoring. This created some tension amongst the rest of the team, but these nerves were soon settled by a compact and unshakable 80 run partnership between Freddie H (57\*) and Joe H (47\*), who steered us over the line to win by 4 wickets. A special mention to Freddie H for battling through having cramp in both calves, but putting his body on the line for the team, which is exactly the mentality we need for the Bath schools T20 cup final against Kingswood.

#### Game #7: Kingswood

In a repeat of last years final, where we found ourselves on the losing side, the boys were hungry for revenge against Kingswood and in doing so hoping to become the first Beechen Cliff team to win the Bath schools T20 cup. Fergal M won the toss and opted for a bat first, so the reliable opening pair of Archie G and Harry L took to the middle. However, Archie G only managed 3 before being bowled, and was soon followed by Josh N who maintained his average of 6 this season. Fortunately, we still had Harry L at the crease, who once again showed his class with a destructive 44, including a particularly large six which cleared the pavilion at Bath Cricket Club by some distance. Dexter T chipped in with an accomplished 32

in the middle overs, before Fergal M suddenly remembered how to hit the ball with three balls of our innings remaining, two of which flew to the boundary which took his total up to a very useful 23\*. We had set Kingswood a respectable and defendable score of 132.

Dexter T got us underway with the ball with a tight over, which was followed by a buffet served by Josh N and was certainly tucked into by one of the Kingswood openers. Having conceded an expensive powerplay, Dexter T dented Kingswood's hopes by striking twice in quick succession, with one of these being the opposition's most dangerous batters. 


