Beechen Cliff has been working with Energy Sparks to reduce the amount of energy we use. This involves pupils and adults across the school taking actions to identify, understand and tackle energy waste.

On the 24th November, we will be turning down the school's heating and seeing how much energy we can save. On the same day last year, our school used 23184 kWh electricity and 2837 kWh of gas, creating 946 kg CO2. Let's see how much we can save by turning down the thermostat by 3 degrees.

It's a great opportunity to think about how much we overheat our spaces as well as a chance to get pupils into the age old habit of

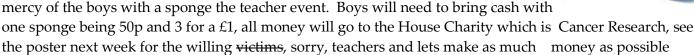

Extra - Curriculum

The Historical Association Great Debate

On Wednesday 15th November two of our Year 12 Politics A Level students and members of Debate Club, Arthur and Toby, competed in the Bristol Historical Association's Great Debate.

The debate took place at the University of Bristol's History Faculty and the brief was to speak for five minutes about a person or place from their local community who they felt deserved greater recognition. Toby chose to speak about Eagle House, otherwise known as Suffragette's Rest, which was an important refuge for suffragettes who had been released from prison after hunger strikes in the early 20th century. Eagle House is located in Batheaston and the arboretum attached to the house, with each tree representing a suffragette who stayed at the house, was destroyed in the 1960s to make way for a housing estate.

Arthur chose to speak about the Bath Pavilion, an Edwardian building in central Bath, which has been the host of hundreds of bands, both of local and international significance over the past 100 years. Arthur argued movingly that music is central to our human existence, so a building with such an important musical heritage deserves greater recognition in our city.



Professor Ronald Hutton from the University of Bristol History Faculty was on the judging panel and congratulated all students who took part on their research and skill in presenting their arguments, describing the evening as a 'firework display of talent'. Arthur was awarded the runner up prize and both students were awarded a certificate by Mary Feerick, chair of the Bristol Historical Association.

A big congratulations to them both, and we hope that you may be inspired to go and visit these important Bath buildings!

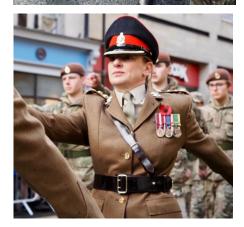

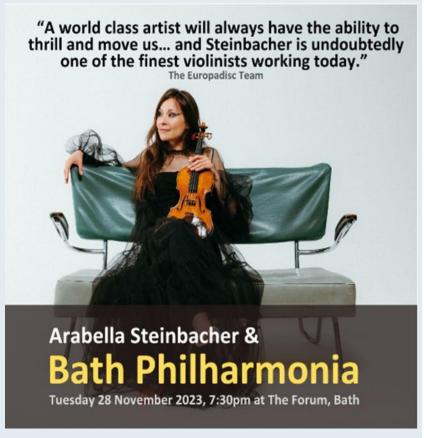

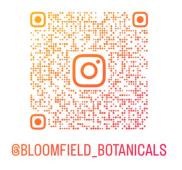
