Joe is now a resident of Switzerland and uses both his German and French language skills daily in his


job in a bank. It was wonderful to have Joe in school and during the day Joe visited many of the classes, talking to the pupils about how learning languages had shaped his life. He told the



E - SCOOTERS AND THE LAW

Dear Parents/Carers





The only electric shooters that can be used on public road are those that are hired as part of the government-backed trials. We would also remind you that to use these trial scooters you must be at least 18 years old and hold a full or provisional driving licence. Private e-scooters can only be used on private land (with the landowners permission) and not on public roads, cycle lanes or pavements.

Electric scooters are clades as powered transporters and fall within the legal definition of a motor vehicle un the Road Traffic Act 1998. This means that the same rules apply to motor vehicles, apply to e-scooters. This includes, but isn't limited to:

- Driving with a licence
- Driving/riding with insurance
- Driving/riding other than on a road

It is not currently possible to get appropriate insurance for privately owned e-scooters meaning that it is illegal to use tem on roads or public spaces. If a child or adult if found riding a private e-scooter on a public road or land the scooter may be seized, and the person, including children could be liable for prosecution for driving with insurance. If the child or adult doesn't hold a provisional or full licence and is stopped riding an e-scooter, they

could be prosecuting for driving other than issued where a licence isn't held. These points would take effect when the person or child applies for a driving license.

Our aim is to keep children safe and out of the criminal justice systems. We want to keep you informed so that we can work together to do this.

E-SCOOTERS AND THE LAW

It is against the law to ride a privately-owned electric scooter (e-scooter) on a public road or pavement.

We understand that buying an e-scooter can be tempting, especially as you can buy them from many popular retailers.

Current law

You can buy an e-scooter, but you can't ride it on a UK public road, cycle lane or pavement. The only place those e-scooters can be used is on private land with the landowner's permission.

What happens if I'm stopped by the police?

The police will advise you of the current law on using an e-scooter legally and have the powers to seize it. Alongside this you could face a fine and/or points on your driving licence as anyone riding an e-scooter, must adhere to the normal traffic laws when on the road. Once seized the e-scooter is destroyed.

- young carers
- children looked- after children with an EHC (education, health, and care) plan
- children who have low attendance rates at school or who are at risk of exclusion
- Children living in areas of high deprivation or from low-income households who are not in receipt of free school meal
- children assessed by professional as being in need, at risk or vulnerable
