

# How to help your son revise for GCSE English Language

#### Task type: Developing reading skills

Resources to support: Your son should have a bank of practice papers for both Language papers

#### How can you help?

Read the extracts together and discuss the ideas in the text

Ask your son to tell you about the methods the writer has chosen to convey their ideas Read an article, speech, letter, essay or leaflet together and discuss the ideas in the text. Consider what the writer's opinion/perspective is and ask your son to tell you about how the writer uses language to present their ideas. Consider what the most impactful elements of these texts are.

#### Task type: Revising key terminology

Resources to support: Your son should have a list of key terminology for each language question

#### How can you help?

Quiz your son on this terminology

#### Task type: Developing writing skills

Resources to support: Your son should have a bank of practice papers for both Language papers

#### How can you help?

Read your son's writing

Ask your son to tell you about the methods he has chosen to present his ideas

Discuss what could make the writing more interesting/ more impactful e.g. could he develop the setting further, make the character seem more realistic by focusing on his emotional reactions; develop the background of the character so that we can see the reason for his actions; cut out a section that doesn't really add anything to the action of the story or character development

# How to help your son revise for GCSE English Literature

#### Task type: Revision lectures

Resources to support: your son should have a login for Massolit.io which gives him access to revision lectures on each Literature text he has studied. <u>https://massolit.io/</u>

#### How can you help?

Watch these together and discuss: how are these ideas similar to/different to what he'd previously understood about the text(s)? Have him make notes as he watches to ensure he can come back to the key information later.

#### Task type: Quotation learning

Resources to support: your son should have a bank of key quotations for each text they study

#### How can you help?

Test your son using flashcards of quotations where they have to fill in the blanks or recall quotations linked to particular themes or images

Ask your son to tell you about why the particular quotation is important- what are the key words in the quotation, what are the implications of these words, what methods has the writer used and what does he think the writer is trying to communicate through these choices

#### Task type: Essay planning and writing

Resources to support: your son should have a bank of practice questions

#### How can you help?

Ask your son to talk you through the ideas in the text related to the question posed: how do these ideas change within the text; why do they change; what message is the writer conveying through these changes; how are they reflective of the time the writer is writing in/ the time the text was set in?

When your son has written or planned an essay, ask your son whether there's anything else he could add e.g. has he fully developed his arguments; has he used at least 3 quotations/references per paragraph and considered the importance of the language and methods in these quotations; has he considered why the writer has made these choices?

#### Lego Robotics success for Harry

Congratulations to Harry and his team on their success in the First Lego League (Lego Robotics) regional competition last week.

FLL is an international STEM competition where over 35,000 teams of students design, build and code a LEGO robot which must then reliably perform multiple tasks in a head-to-head competition with other teams. Simultaneously the team must also develop an innovative new technology product to present to judges in a Dragons' Den style presentation. As well as scoring the most points in the robot competition the team also highly impressed the judges with their prototype for an electronic safety device to assist deaf people whilst they are surfing.

Harry's team won the regional competition and will now go through to the National Finals in Harrogate in April.

What a fantastic achievement. Well done Harry!

# BEECHEN CLIFF THREE PEAKS CHALLENGE



# FRIDAY 28TH JULY TO 1ST JULY

The Beechen Cliff Three Peaks Challenge is one of the many endurance challenges offered to students. It involves the ascent of the three highest mountains in Scotland, Wales and England, without undue stopping for rest or sustenance. The Challenge, taking place over a three and a half day period will include one days travel to the first mountain and half a day from the last mountain to home, driving 1200 miles, ascending over 3000 metres and walking a distance walked exceeding an Olympic marathon.

Whilst it is a challenge that will test the 'metal' of all participants, it is a group activity and team work is vital if the challenge is to be completed in the true spirit of adventure. Beechen Cliff still remains one of the few schools in the United Kingdom to undertake such an arduous challenge. This is possible as we have the expertise and experience in successfully organising this type of activity and we have a dedicated team willing literally to go the extra mile. This challenge is as always an awesome and unforgettable adventure.




We are absolutely thrilled to have Megan Thachil join the Solution Focused Team at Beechen.

# Paul Watts



The school community, both past and present, was shocked to learn of Paul's untimely loss at the age of fifty nine.

Paul was Head of Science and then Deputy Headmaster of Beechen Cliff, the latter role one he fulfilled with dexterity and skill for fourteen years. To many within Beechen Cliff he was a colleague and a friend, a role model for us all and a man who 'walked the talk' of education and did so much to enhance Beechen Cliff and the lives of the pupils within it.

Paul's role as Curriculum Deputy saw him build a strong team of Heads of Department, creating an energy and sense of belief in the role of each subject that the boys could all find something positive to take from their academic experience, even those who were a little more reluctant. He showed through his own classroom practice that he was an exceptional teacher and he always took a quiet pride in the fact that his Physics results were always the best in the school, something his pupils recognised and respected. His approach, 'old fashioned and rigorous' in his own words, always seemed to find favour with the boys and, despite his ability to be gently moved off subject by the mention of football tactics, he remained steadfast in his adherence to the high standards that brought such good outcomes.

His contribution to the wider life of the school is still seen in a number of areas. He had an exceptional eye for design and presentation of material and it was his drive that saw us move into the twenty-first century in terms of a website which worked for parents and which actually did the job of presenting a face to the world in a form which was then picked up and copied by others - 'imitation', as he said, a strong form of flattery. The uniform that the boys wear today was his design, despite my efforts to introduce a beautiful wool blazer with a nice binding. 'Can you imagine what it would look like after they've played football in that?' He was right, of course, as he was in so many areas of planning and implementation. He brought wit and (brutal) honesty to the proceedings in senior meetings, never allowing us to get carried away or to be too pleased with ourselves. A teacher who believed that the lesson he had just observed was bordering on brilliant would be told quite clearly that they were under an unfortunate delusion. Never unkind, always honest and always able to make those around him want to achieve the best possible for the boys. He understood all too well that everything we had was potentially fragile and could be easily damaged.

It was Paul who masterminded and drove the plans for projects which would become the new Music building, English building, Pavilion and the new Refectory. Interested in every detail, he made clear his vision, articulated in a way that all could embrace and then worked to deliver elements of the school which have been instrumental in giving the children a learning environment which would barely have been dreamed of by the previous generation of Beechen Cliff schoolboys.

He could often be found in his office poring over magazines that featured various coloured dots and sweeping arrows, making notes and tutting to himself.

I believed, for many years, that these were diagrams within an Institute of Physics publication. When I suggested as much he gave me a look which could curdle cream and made it clear that these were football training tactics and he was deciding which ones to employ 'with the boys' when the next session came along. Every Friday during the coldest part of the year he would gather with his band of enthusiastic coaches and deliver a programme to the ranks of Year 7 boys who would gather together. As with any proud Liverpudlian Everton supporter he delivered his plans and instructions more in hope than expectation of success, although the teams nurtured so carefully by him in the early years at the school did go on to achieve notable success.

Quiet but steadfast in his faith, Paul delivered a number of extraordinary and moving elements of the Easter assembly in the Sports Hall, speaking to thirteen hundred youngsters, who, had it been anyone else, would have been glancing at watches and planning their time of arrival home at the end of term. Paul's approach made them think; made all of us think, in fact. He could take the message of hope and redemption, formulated so long ago, and make it resonate with his audience. Never dogmatic, always open to debate and cheerful with it, his gentle influence guided the delivery of many, many assemblies I delivered, to be enjoyed or endured by young and captive audiences.

His devotion to and pride in his family was obvious to all who knew him well. He lit up when he spoke of them and it is clear that they provided the powerful foundations on which he was able to build his career and work. His loss is unfathomable and Beechen Cliff has lost someone very special. Roy Ludlow, my predecessor, told me at my interview that Paul was 'a good man'. He was so right and so very clearly delivering an understatement at the same time. He will be with us in so many ways in the months and years to come, such was his influence.

Our sincerest condolences and our respect for Paul as a school community go to his wife Jane and his children Maddie and Angus.
