
Dear Parents and Carers,

Uniform

We believe it is important for all pupils to attend school smartly dressed in their school uniform. We believe uniform is important and can play a key role in:

Thank-you to all our parents who ensure that their child is correctly dressed for school every day.

Please be reminded that;

- Blazers are not optional and are required every day. School jumpers, however, are an optional item
- Coats should be plain and standard school style (no hooded tops, leather/denim jackets). Hoodies are not permitted
- Shoes must be the black leather type available from any high street retailer. Trainers (Nike, Vans, Adidas etc), canvas shoes or boots are not acceptable.

Geography Residential, Colehayes 2024



On 13th March the Year 12 Geography cohort set out on their 3 day residential trip of geography goodness! Seeing in the launch of their Geography Coursework.

The first stop off was Elberry Cove. A lovely little pebble bay between Brixham and Paignton, on the British Riviera. Luckily for all the Geographers the rain held off for us to complete our beach fieldwork. We kicked

off the trip with traditional geography fieldwork, looking at beach profiles and sediment sorting. With a (small!) lecture from Mr Brewer connecting their learning in the classroom to what they were seeing around them, talking about wave energy, sediment sorting and the joys of risk assessments. Students settled into a few hours of data collection before we then hopped on the coach to head to our home for the next few evenings, Colehayes.



Colehayes Park is a beautiful Grade II Listed, Georgian mansion that sits in private woodland, located on the edge of the stunning Dartmoor National Park. After playing ping pong, exploring the grounds and a well earned dinner, the students settled into 2 hours of coursework sessions. Working with the Geography department to firm up ideas, finalise data collection for the next day or start on their proposal forms.



Off at 9am, after a full English breakfast to fuel us, onto our next study site, the rather wet city of Plymouth. Many students were collecting their own data here, with some



exploring the environmental quality of Devonport, others seeing the success of Royal William Yard. The rest got to explore one of their big case studies on regeneration, looking at the different areas of change and assessing their success. Back to Colehayes for the evening and another full on evening coursework session, finalising all proposal forms and firming up coursework ideas. All the students worked amazingly hard and the staff were very impressed.

The final day saw us walking the spit of Dawlish Warren, examining the coastal defences that have been put in place. The sun came out for us here and many enjoyed a relaxing lunch getting some rays. Before we were back on the coach home.

The Geography department would like to thank all students for all their hard work on the trip and for being great company!

Combined Cadet Force

It has been a busy term for the CCF contingent; the first exercise away of 2024, first aid courses completed and the assessment of each cadet for weapons handling and safety with ammunition.

An 'icing on the cake' for some cadets was the opportunity to visit an airsoft venue and to put some of their newly acquired skills into practice.



In January and February the cadets were very much focused on lessons in using the weapons system (L98 rifle), making sure they are safe in handling it and also very knowledgeable in terms of the working parts, cleaning kit and the process for disassembling and reassembling. It's quite a challenging process and it's clear from the relieved and delighted faces of the cadets that pass the weapons handling test that they feel a sense of achievement in being permitted to use the L98 on





In addition to the weapons lessons the cadets have been through a first aid course which has made sure that they are able to deal with a number of everyday emergencies, such as choking and cardiac episodes, together with the obvious 'military themed' scenarios involving wounds and broken bones. The assessment of their practical skills is done through some fairly realistic 'emergency scenarios' involving road traffic accidents, electric shocks, fainting passers by and falls from ladders. Exercise Next Step (at Scraesdon Fort near Plymouth) gave them the





opportunity to deal with the less 'domestic' events resulting in injury. The exercise included abseiling, using weapons for the first time, laser tag and tactics in the field. Challenging Cornish weather needed battling but the



exercise for the first time.





In addition to the activities mentioned, the cadets have been able to further their skills in putting up their bashers (rudimentary tents), cooking using the army ration packs and learning the art of taking information from orders, FIBUA (fighting in a built up environment) and navigating in the field. The Beechen Cliff cadets have been excellent in all areas of contingent work and we have been very impressed by their good humour, commitment and discipline.









After five years of commitment and service to the cadets we said goodbye to Corporal Anderson, stalwart of the group. He has been exceptional in all areas of leadership and his quiet, thoughtful and high quality support will be missed. He leaves to prepare himself for the forthcoming A level examinations. In his final parade he received the



contingent cufflinks which are given to any long standing cadet with excellent service. We wish him well.

In addition to the activities involving current cadets, we have just had the assembly for Year 8 boys, introducing the cadet experience to them and allowing them to 'sign up' for the induction process which will take place over the course of the Summer Term. We have a very healthy crop of potential recruits and I am sure that those who commit to, and are accepted in, the contingent in September will have a varied and rich experience in the year ahead.


The potential started to come together with the addition of a couple of Year 11 players, Bailey, George, Korben, Owen and Leo who all played key roles in different games in the cup run. There were impressive wins in subsequent rounds away from home at Sir Bernard Lovell School and Backwell School before a mouth watering home tie against Millfield. And what a game that was. We raced to a 3-1 half time lead and then with 10 minutes to go we were in dreamland leading 6-1 before a late onslaught from Millfield to pull it back to 6-4 with 5 minutes remaining. We found resilience and another gear to shatter their spirit and finished the job at 8-4.

The subsequent long journey to Torquay was one to forget. We were caught napping and trailing 2-0 with 10 mins remaining and no subs remaining due to injuries in a pretty brutal encounter. One didn't really expect these sorts at the home of a Grammar school! We chased it with nothing to lose and despite hitting the post, crossbar and various parts of their keeper's body, it just wasn't going to be our

day. But what it gave the team was an unwavering collective spirit - they stuck together and looked after each other in hostile conditions and walked away a tighter unit. I count it as a proud moment in my 32 years as coach of the First XI.

This to date has been our only defeat this season. The ensuing local league games have not challenged us but given us more time to shape our play.
