Uniform and Equipment reminders

Uniform

We believe it is important for all pupils to attend school smartly dressed in their school uniform. We believe uniform is important and can play a key role in:

- promoting the ethos of the school
- providing a sense of belonging and identity
- setting an appropriate tone for education

Thank-you to all our parents who ensure that their child is correctly dressed for school every day.

Please be reminded that;

- Blazers are not optional and are required every day.
- School jumpers are an optional item but we do not allow any other jumper or hoody to be worn.
- Coats should be plain and standard school style (no hooded tops, leather/denim jackets).
- Shoes must be the black leather type available from any high street retailer. Trainers (Nike, Vans, Adidas etc), canvas shoes or boots are not acceptable.

YEAR 7-SCHOOL DISCO WITH HAYESFIELD



Centurion Challenge 2025

Important Centurion Meeting

A Centurion Challenge meeting is scheduled for Wednesday 4th June at 7:00 pm in the Refectory.

All Challenger and parents/guardians should attend. There will be a presentation overview of the operation of the event, and there will be a check of challenger details and mobile contact numbers.

Marshalling the event

The marshalling points on the Centurion Challenge play a critical role in the running of the challenge. It cannot run without your help. Therefore if you feel that you can assist with marshalling in any way, or indeed with other aspects, please complete the Google Document by using the link below https://forms.gle/hJrLa3fhZB2LEuWC7

If you can indicate what days / times you are available this will help in the allocation of the marshalling points. You will need to be aware that as soon as the challenge has moved beyond the Devizes Base Camp, travel time will increase from 50 minutes to over an hour and, as the Challenge starts at 06:00 on the Saturday & Sunday, some points have a very early start time, others will have a late finish. The opening / closing time of each check point depends upon how spread out the challengers are, and this will vary greatly during the day. All marshaling points will be closed by sunset (about 21:20), however Challengers in between marshalling points will be collected at the next marshaling point. This inevitably extends the time that some marshalling points are in operation.

Some marshalling points will need to be operated for several hours – we have AM/PM 'shifts' but you can control one for the whole day if that is preferable. All marshalling points are on the canal towpath and some may be isolated places, but they are all easily accessible.

It is essential you are at your designated point for the times stated, so please do not over commit yourself to a time/place. Once the Challenge has started it flows continuously and with your assistance seamlessly. You will be contacted by messages (WhatsApp Group) with updates and will be asked to confirm who has passed and when. All the Challengers will be allocated numbers and they will give you their number as they pass through.

Rethinking Resistance

Recently, we took part in a 24-hour global conference hosted by the Solution Focused community. It's a free event where practitioners from all over the world come together to share how they use the approach in a wide range of settings. One theme that really stood out was something called "the death of resistance."

This idea was originally shared by the founders of the Solution Focused approach, Steve de Shazer and Insoo Kim Berg. They encouraged us to think differently when things aren't going to plan, whether we're parents, carers, or professionals. Rather than labelling children or young people as 'resistant,' they invited us to consider: what if they have a good reason for what they're doing, even if, in the moment, it doesn't seem helpful?

It's a powerful reminder that when something isn't working, it's often more helpful to ask:

What could I do differently?

As parents and carers, this invites us to pause and reflect when our child is, for example, struggling with going to school, struggling to completing homework, or finding it hard to communicate. What might be behind that behaviour? What might they be trying to tell us in the only way they know how?

Solution Focused questions can help shift the conversation:

- ♦ What would you hope to be different?
- If we could have a useful conversation about this, what might that look like?
- ♦ How can we support you?
- Here's what we've noticed you doing well, how might we build on that together?

It's a shift in lens, from seeing children as resistant, to seeing them as doing the best they can with what they've got. And maybe, in response, we can try something different too.

Face to Face 3-day Routes into STEM

AtkinsRéalis hosts an Apprenticeship Awareness Day for Year 12 Students

This week, Year 12 students from Beechen Cliff and Hayesfield schools took part in an inspiring Apprenticeship Awareness Day. The event was led by our former student and national award-winner Gabriella Goddard-Palmer. Gabriella was joined by her colleagues, Sam Stott, Lucy Hanman, Sam Goddard-Palmer, and Elizabeth Willmore from global engineering and consulting firm AtkinsRéalis. Together, they provided students with valuable information and advice about career pathways in engineering, consulting, and beyond.

The event aimed to broaden students' understanding of apprenticeship pathways as a viable and rewarding alternative to traditional university routes. Through a series of interactive workshops and presentations, students explored the range of roles available within engineering, infrastructure, and project management, and gained valuable insight into the apprenticeship application process, day-to-day responsibilities, and long-term career prospects.



The sessions also included personal stories from current apprentices at AtkinsRéalis, offering a real-world perspective that resonated strongly with the students. One of our students commented: "It was a really informative and inspiring day, great to hear from the apprentices themselves, giving a real insight into the application process and life as an apprentice".

Head of Sixth Form, Kim Mather said, "this was a fantastic opportunity for our students to engage directly with professionals in the field. It has opened their eyes to the variety of career routes available to them and has inspired many to consider apprenticeships as a first-choice option."

Gabriella said, 'the awareness of apprenticeships and the benefits they can offer as an alternative to university are still so overlooked! We hoped that this day of presentations and interactive workshops inspired students to explore apprenticeships more and consider them as a genuine post-18 career pathway. The real-world experience you gain, the free degree/ wider qualifications you can earn and the excellent networking and professional development opportunities available makes doing an apprenticeship much more beneficial than the traditional university route these days'.

Events like this are an integral part of our Future Horizons Careers programme's commitment to preparing students for life beyond school by exposing them to diverse career opportunities and real-world experiences.




