Equipment you will need to start the course.

As a minimum, you will need the get the following equipment to start the course in September –

- •A DSLR camera. There are many to choose from, and shop around for the best prices, but good starter cameras are ones such as the Nikon D3300 and Canon EOS1100D. These sell for between £350 £400 with a lens. Make sure you get a memory card with the camera as well.
- •A Tripod
- •A sketchbook. You will need to get one of these straight away, as I want you to start taking notes on things you find around you, and things you see in galleries over the year until September. (Again, if going to a gallery is a chore for you, is photography the option for you?)

If you choose to opt for Photography, I will give more specific advice about kit to individuals.

Photography – So why would you choose it?

- •Any person who takes on the Photography 'A' level will enjoy the course, providing they have chosen it for the right reasons. Photography takes time, commitment and as you have seen, money, so only take the course on if you are serious about it.
- •Are you interested in the media? Do you find yourself looking at photographs in newspapers, magazines or in galleries and feel inspired by them? If the answer to that question is yes, this course might be for you.
- •Have you an interest in working as a Photographer, or working in TV or film?
- Are you artistically or creatively inclined?



A Level Photography Course – Syllabus

- •ALL assessed work for the first year is coursework based. There is no exam until the end of the second year. This means that the first part of year one is dedicated to 'foundation' skills. Learning the techniques and craft of Photography, moving on to the main project work, the Personal Investigation after Easter of the first year. Any work done between September and Easter of the first year can be included in the Personal Investigation.
- •60% of the awarded grade is the Personal Investigation, 40% is the exam which commences in February of the second year.
- •ALL STUDENTS now to have to show evidence of drawing, sketching and artistic experimentation in their sketchbooks. Sketchbooks are also used to record gallery visits, thoughts and experiences and techniques as they progress through the course. This is ongoing, and is a requirement of the exam board.




