

From Reluctant to Reading: Simple Ways to Help Engage Your Child in Reading

As you may know, it's the National Year of Reading—a campaign encouraging children and young people to read more often and enjoy it. It promotes reading as not just a school skill, but a valuable part of everyday life.

While some students read for pleasure independently, others may struggle—especially if they lack confidence. With the right approach, parents can make a real difference in building engagement and enjoyment

Making Reading Feel Less Like “Work”

Many reluctant readers associate reading with pressure. At home, remove that feeling. Let your child choose what they read—graphic novels, magazines, or articles. All reading counts; developing the habit is what matters most.

Give The Choice and Control

Children engage more when they feel ownership. A visit to a library or bookshop, with freedom to choose, can have a big impact—even if the material seems “too easy.”

Build Reading into Daily Life

Reading doesn't have to be long or formal. It can happen through everyday tasks like reading recipes, following instructions, or exploring hobbies online. These small moments build confidence.

Be a Reading Role Model

Children notice adult habits. Seeing you read—and hearing you talk about it—reinforces its value.

Keep It Short and Manageable

Short sessions of 10–15 minutes feel more achievable and can build over time.

Talk About Reading (Without Testing)

Keep conversations relaxed. Questions like “Did you enjoy it?” encourage engagement without pressure

Use Technology Positively

Audiobooks, e-books, and apps can make reading more accessible and appealing.

Celebrate Progress

Focus on effort—finishing a short book or reading more regularly are all successes worth recognising.



Upcoming Author Visit for Year 7 & Year 8 Tom Palmer







Morocco World Challenge Expedition - February 2026

Over the February half term break, a group of 17 intrepid explorers in Year 13 embarked upon their long awaited charity expedition to Morocco. The students, along with myself, Mr Burnell, and our World Challenge leader 'Mags' boarded our early morning flight to Marrakech from Bristol airport full of excitement but also a little trepidation - the school's first World Challenge trip in over a decade.

On the first day, the students undertook some trip planning and administration - getting our 'group money' changed into Moroccan Dirham and also a local sim card. We explored the famous Jemma el-Fna, Marrakech's iconic main square, full of juice stalls, vendors, snake charmers and entertainers.

For the next three days, we headed to the mountainous Amizmiz region in the High Atlas mountains. We stayed in small deprived villages (Ait Zouton and Ait Hamed) in the homes of generous local families. It's amazing how a game of football, skipping rope, or cards can bring groups together despite the language barriers! We all learned some Berber cultures and language from our guides Neyma and Hamza. We went hiking for a few days around the beautiful mountains and valleys and saw first-hand the devastation of the 2023 Earthquake as we were trekking near the epicenter of the disaster.



After travelling to the next part of our trip in the 'Berber City' of Ouarzazate, we met our next host, Bali. He delighted us with a cookery class and the opportunity to try on some traditional Berber clothes. Our purpose in Ouarzazate was to complete our charity work at a local school. We undertook three days of construction to improve the school's football pitch and gardens. It was great to see how our fundraised money was spent on buying the materials and hiring the local labourer.



Another highlight was the opportunity to visit Ait Ben Haddou, a former caravan route between Marrakech and the Sahara desert.

Finally, back in Marrakech again we enjoyed a few relaxing days of tourist site visits and shopping in the bustling 'souks'. It was the trip of a lifetime, and an opportunity the school hopes to offer again in the future!

Spring Forward: Using a Solution-Focused Approach to Support Young People

As the days grow longer and the natural world begins to awaken, the spring equinox offers a powerful metaphor for growth, balance, and new beginnings. Just as nature gently shifts from winter's stillness into spring's energy, this can be a meaningful time to support young people in making positive changes in their own lives.

One particularly helpful way to do this is through a solution-focused approach—a simple yet powerful method that encourages young people to look ahead, build on their strengths, and notice what's already working.

What is a Solution-Focused Approach?

Rather than concentrating on problems or what's gone wrong, a solution-focused approach helps young people:

- Identify their goals and what they want life to look like
- Recognise their existing strengths and successes
- Take small, manageable steps toward positive change

It's about shifting the question from “What's the problem?” to “What's already helping—and how can we do more of it?”

Why Spring is the Perfect Time

The spring equinox represents balance—equal day and night—and marks a turning point toward light and growth. This mirrors the solution-focused mindset:

- A balance between acknowledging challenges and focusing on possibilities
- A shift toward hope, growth, and forward movement
- An opportunity to “plant seeds” for change

How Parents Can Use This Approach at Home

Here are some simple, practical ways to bring a solution-focused approach into everyday conversations:

1. Notice What’s Going Well

Take time to point out positives, no matter how small:

- “I noticed you got started on your homework earlier today—that’s great.”
- “You handled that situation really calmly.”

This helps young people build confidence and awareness of their own abilities.

2. Ask Future-Focused Questions

Take time to point out positives, no matter how small:

- “What would a really good week at school look like for you?”
- “If things were just a little bit better, what would be different?”

This keeps the focus on possibilities rather than problems.

3. Use Scaling Questions

These help children reflect and track progress:

- “On a scale of 1 to 10, how was your day?”
- “What makes it a 5 and not a 3?”
- “What would help move it up by one point?”

This builds self-awareness and highlights small steps forward.



4. Celebrate Small Steps

Just like the gradual change of seasons, progress doesn't happen all at once. Recognise and celebrate effort and improvement:

- “You tried something new today—that took courage.”
- “You kept going even when it was tricky.”

5. Encourage a ‘Growth Mindset’

Help your child see challenges as opportunities to learn:

- Replace “I can't do this” with “I can't do this yet.”
- Talk about learning, effort, and persistence

Planting Seeds for the Months Ahead

Spring reminds us that growth takes time, patience, and the right conditions. By using a solution-focused approach, parents can help create a supportive environment where young people feel capable, hopeful, and motivated to move forward.

Small conversations can plant powerful seeds. With encouragement, curiosity, and a focus on strengths, those seeds can grow into confidence, resilience, and positive change.

As we step into this new season together, let's take the opportunity to notice what's working, nurture potential, and help our young people flourish.

Max and Alex provided a thoughtful and engaging overview of their individual pathways since leaving school, offering valuable insight into the transition from sixth form to the workplace. They spoke candidly about the opportunities and challenges they have encountered so far, giving students a realistic and well-rounded perspective on what to expect when pursuing an apprenticeship.

The session was run as an informal Q&A, during which our students asked a range of insightful questions about application processes, day-to-day responsibilities, and the skills and attitudes needed to succeed. Sharing their experiences was greatly appreciated and proved highly beneficial for those considering this pathway.
