Iceland Trip February 2026



I was lucky to recently visit Iceland on a sixth form trip organised by the geography department. We touched down in Reykjavik for what would be an exciting and educational adventure

Above all, my personal highlight was seeing the Northern Lights in their full glory from a snowy hilltop at midnight



Visiting Iceland allowed us to see unique volcanic landscapes such as Grabrok crater, a dormant volcano which we traversed, and we navigated Raufarholshellir lava tunnel, formed over 5,000 years ago. We also saw the infamous Eyjafjallajokull which erupted in 2010 and caused most of Europe's airspace to shut down due to the large ash clouds, the biggest disruption to aviation since 9/11.

We visited many scenic waterfalls such as Gullfoss, the iconic two-tier waterfall which drops over 30 metres into the Hvita river, and Skogafoss, the resting place of one of Iceland's most famous trolls who can still be seen in the cliff face today.

Of course, it wouldn't be a geography trip without a bit of learning involved. Various talks and experiences had been organised which directly related to our A level topics such as tectonic hazards, the water cycle and the carbon cycle.

We saw processes such as rifting and Continental Drift. We visited Thingvellir National Park where the Althing (Iceland's parliament) was established in 930 AD and walked along the constructive boundary running between the North American and Eurasian plates, which are moving apart 2cm every year. Seeing Eyjafjallajokull was particularly useful as this is one of the major case studies we learnt in class

The final element of any memorable school trip is to have lots of fun. We made good use of ice axes and crampons on a glacier traverse and we luckily didn't lose anyone down a crevasse.

One of my favourite aspects was visiting geothermal spas such as the Blue Lagoon where I experienced Icelandic spa culture and learned how the people of Iceland use the hot springs.

Another highlight for me was to spend free time sightseeing in Reykjavik to visit the Hallgrímskirkja church standing at over 75 metres tall, the Harpa national concert hall with its unique glass architecture and many others.

In conclusion, our trip to Iceland was an unforgettable experience which brought our studies to life. Seeing volcanic landscapes, glaciers, and geothermal activity helped bring to life topics we had only learnt about in the classroom. The trip was both educational and exciting, and will be a trip that I will always remember





Easter Recipes

Some tasty Easter recipes to try in the lead up to Easter.

Easter Cheesecake

Stage 1: Prepare Biscuit Base



1. Crush 300g biscuits. Mix with 150g melted butter. Press into 2 egg halves. Chill 20 mins.

Stage 2: Melt White Chocolate



2. Melt 350g white chocolate gently over hot water. Cool for 5 mins.

Stage 3: Create Filling



3. Whisk 165g cream cheese, 200g mascarpone, 300ml double cream. Fold in cooled chocolate.

Stage 4: Assemble & Chill



4. Spoon mixture into egg bases. Smooth top. Chill 6+ hrs. Decorate with Easter chocolates.

Hot Cross Buns Recipe

1. Mix the Dough



Heat 150ml milk, 25g butter, 10ml oil. Cool. Mix 250g strong bread flour, ½ tsp salt, 38g sugar, 1 sachet yeast. Add 38g sultanas, zest 1 orange, 1 chopped apple, ¼ tsp cinnamon. Combine with juice from an orange and 1 egg to form sticky dough.

2. Knead



Lightly knead for 5 mins until smooth and elastic.

3. Divide & Rise



Divide into 6-8 balls. Place on tray, cover with oiled clingfilm, leave to rise until doubled.

4. Pipe Crosses



Mix 40g plain flour with 5 tbsp water. Pipe crosses onto buns.

5. Bake



Bake at 220C for 20 mins until golden brown.

6. Glaze



Gently heat 2 tbsp apricot jam, sieve. Brush over warm buns and leave to cool.

Easter Biscuits

EASTER BISCUITS



Ingredients

100g golden caster sugar
1 egg
½ tsp baking powder
80g currants
100g soft butter
250g plain flour
2 tbsp milk
1 tsp mixed spice

PREPARE THE DOUGH



1. Heat your oven to 200°C. Put greaseproof paper on a big baking tray.
2. Beat the sugar and butter together until soft and fluffy. Add the egg and whip until fully incorporated.
3. Fold in the flour, baking powder and spice.

ROLL & SHAPE



4. Gently mix the lot together whilst adding the milk to yield a roll-out-able dough.
5. Lastly, knead in the currants.
6. On a floured table, roll your dough to about 5mm thick.
7. Stamp out your biscuits with a pretty cutter and lay on the tray.

BAKE & FINISH



8. Bake until the edges just start to turn golden (about 12 minutes) and remove immediately.
9. Sprinkle with caster sugar while still hot, then allow to cool.

ACE Cybersecurity Competition Final at UWE

We had an excellent day at UWE on Friday at the ACE Cybersecurity Competition Final at UWE. The year 10 team consisting of Tomas A, Eddie J, Lucas G and Cyrus PD worked well as a team to achieve second place behind a team of year 12s.



Well done boys!

Last Friday, we attended the regional finals of the ACE cyber first computing competition at UWE in Bristol.

We'd been invited to the event after competing in a first round sent out a few months prior. During the morning, we were tasked with answering questions on cyber-security related topics including encryption and cyber attack methods and responses, many of which required prior knowledge not mentioned anywhere else. The questions got increasingly more difficult as the day went on, ranging from 10 seconds to 10 minute answers. In the afternoon, we participated in a "battleships" style task, where we had to solve incoming security threats, all while answering even more questions and under time pressure. This challenge also became increasingly more difficult as the questions continued to get in the way of the task, more and more towards the end of the day. At the end of the day, when the results were announced, we had placed first in not only our age group but also the year 11 age group above. We were narrowly beaten to the top spot overall by a strong team of year 12s from a grammar school, with a team of students from Bath College also disqualified for having an advantageous bug, although they performed really well. However, we all agree that we performed exceptionally well in the given conditions.



WELLBEING

Dear Parents and Carers,

In our ongoing focus on children's wellbeing, we are always reflecting on how the words we use shape understanding — and self-understanding.

Recently, researchers at King's College London have been exploring a different way of thinking about ADHD. Some researchers have suggested that what we currently call Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder might also be understood, in part, as a form of "hyper-curiosity."

This is not an official renaming of ADHD, and the diagnosis remains important for many families in accessing support. However, the idea invites us to pause and consider an important question:

What if some of the traits we see as difficulties are also expressions of curiosity, creativity and exploration?

Many children with ADHD show:

- A strong drive to explore and ask questions
- Deep focus on topics that interest them
- Quick, imaginative thinking
- High levels of energy
- A readiness to respond to what's happening around them

In structured environments like classrooms, these traits can sometimes look like distraction or impulsivity. Yet in other settings — creative work, problem-solving, sport, leadership and innovation — the very same qualities can be powerful strengths.

Why Language Matters

Words such as deficit can subtly shape how children see themselves. Language does more than describe — it creates meaning. Over time, the stories children hear about themselves can influence confidence, motivation and wellbeing.

This does not mean ignoring challenges. Many families manage very real difficulties around concentration, emotional regulation and school routines. Support, adjustments and sometimes medical input are vital and valued.

At the same time, we can widen the story

Instead of only saying:

- "They can't focus,"

we might also notice:

- "They focus deeply on things they care about"

Instead of:

- "They're too much,"

we might consider:

- “They bring energy and enthusiasm.”

Both realities can exist together.

Applying This to All Children and Young People

While this conversation has emerged through ADHD research, the principle applies much more broadly.

All children benefit when adults:

- Look for what is working as well as what is difficult
- Separate behaviour from identity
- Stay curious about the need beneath the behaviour
- Notice effort, persistence and intention

When a child is restless, withdrawn, oppositional or distracted, we can gently ask ourselves:

- What might this behaviour be communicating?
- What strengths could be sitting underneath this?
- How can I respond in a way that builds identity rather than diminishes it?

Sometimes a child labelled as “bossy” may be showing leadership.

A child described as “quiet” may be deeply reflective.

A young person seen as “argumentative” may be developing critical thinking.

By widening the language we use, we create more space for children to see themselves as capable, valued and understood — even while they are still learning and growing.

A Gentle Reflection

You might like to notice this week:

- When does my child’s curiosity shine?
- What captures their attention fully?
- When does their energy become an asset?
- How do the words I use influence how they understand themselves?

Small shifts in language can make a meaningful difference to how children experience who they are.

THE MISSING HISTORY OF PRIVATE GODFREY The Actor ARNOLD RIDLEY

TODAY Arnold Ridley is best remembered as the much-loved Dad's Army character, Private Godfrey, but the part of Godfrey came towards the end of a long theatrical career and a truly remarkable life. Having survived the horrors of the First World War and a stuttering start to his theatrical career, he began writing plays, one of which, *The Ghost Train*, enjoyed immense success. Many more successful West End plays followed alongside an involvement in the movie-making business which resulted in his financial ruin.

Evacuated from France in 1940, he was invalided out of the British Army for a second time, and then began his struggle to find a place in the new theatrical landscape. There followed many anxious years until the miracle of *Dad's Army* restored his faith in himself and at last provided him with a modest measure of renewed celebrity and security.

A well-drawn character can easily seem so complete that it's difficult to distinguish the fictional character from the actor. *Were You Anyone Before Dad's Army?* draws back the curtain and provides a touching, life-affirming account of one man's unwavering courage and resilience: a true hero, although he himself would certainly have disclaimed the label!
