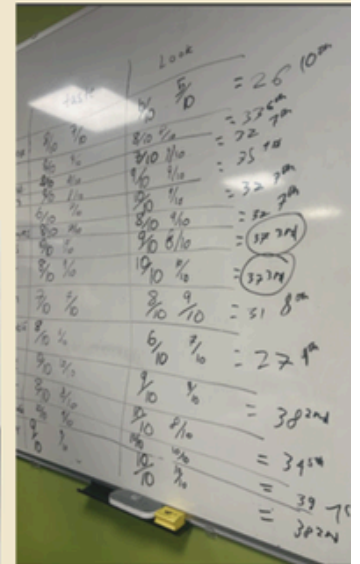

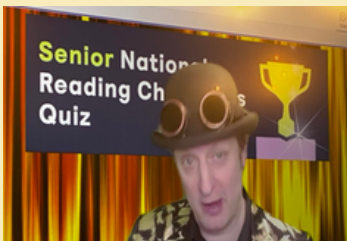

2026 is the National Year of Reading. We are now one term in and I wanted to update you on how things have been going in school!



The National Year of Reading 2026 Spring Term (January–March) focused on launching the "Go All In" campaign, aiming to spark excitement for reading through classroom activities and "Go All In Together" live events. It emphasizes establishing reading habits and assessing individual pupil interests early in the year.



In school, we have focused on teacher training in specific reading skills to support all students access texts quickly and accurately. On World Book Day, teachers shared some favourite or fascinating texts and explained why they were special to them. The buzz around school was brilliant and I am so grateful to the staff for 'going all in'!

We entered a team into the National Reading Champions quiz and our team came third in their heat - which was a real achievement!

LITERATURE ACROSS BORDERS



Year 7 and Year 8 students participated in the final Literature Across Borders session this week. Run by Bath Spa University's Creative Writing for Children course leaders, the project connects children across three continents to discuss reading and help books 'travel' globally. This year's themes were children fighting for rights and the 1947 partition of India

The Themes

The themes in *Across the Line* were at the start, dark and depressing since the families were attacked during partition and separated but then in the future, despite it starting oddly, they manage to join the family together and everyone feels content and fulfilled.

The themes in *The Night Diary* were of perseverance towards the end but during the train ride the themes shifted drastically to intense fear and anxiety because they did not know if they would die and the moments of terror put the conflict outside of their family into perspective on how devastating it actually was.

The endings

The ending of *Across The Line* was not expected, however it was still a good ending because they managed to resolve generations of problems and all be happy.

The ending of *The Night Diary* was not expected as I believed Kazi would never see the family again and the emotional scene of his return helped emphasise the struggle that families in that time had to go through in order to remain connected.



The Rights group looked at two books: *The Boy at the Back of the Class* (UK) and *Dear Mrs Naidoo* (India). They worked hard to create a brilliant presentation to share with the other students in the USA and India. Our students are part of our anti-bullying team, so understood many of the issues really well.

The Partition group looked at three books: *1947 Torn Apart*, *Across The Line* and *The Night Diary*. Our students were fascinated by this brutal period of British and Indian history and were shocked by what happened when Britain left India in 1947. The students had thoughtful opinions and a great discussion.

All these books are available to borrow from the school library.

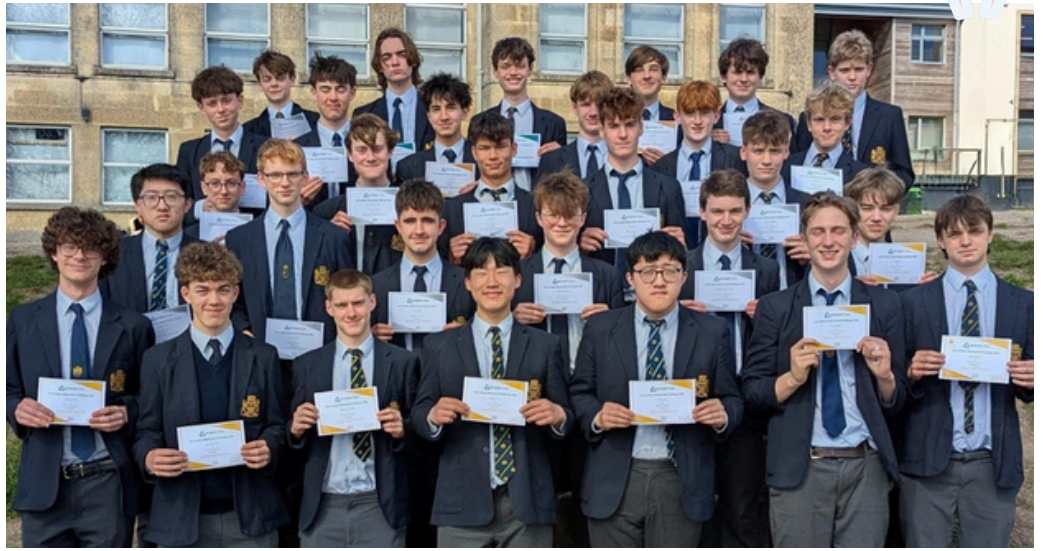

Ten Tors

As the Ten Tors event nears at the start of May, teams from Beechen Cliff have been down to Dartmoor training. The most recent visit was last weekend. The groups went down on Friday for an early expedition start on Saturday morning. They were blessed with dry weather but with a biting north westerly to keep things fresh. Being on the western side of the moor there was no real escape either.



The groups are training for distances of 35, 45 and 55 miles respectively and their routes for the weekend reflected these demands. All groups wild camped on the moor on Saturday night to replicate the self-sufficient nature of the Ten Tors challenge. They were up at 4.30am to be away from camp at 6.00am. Given the clocks going forward this was an even bigger challenge to those who are not early birds!

CCF - Exercise Next Steps

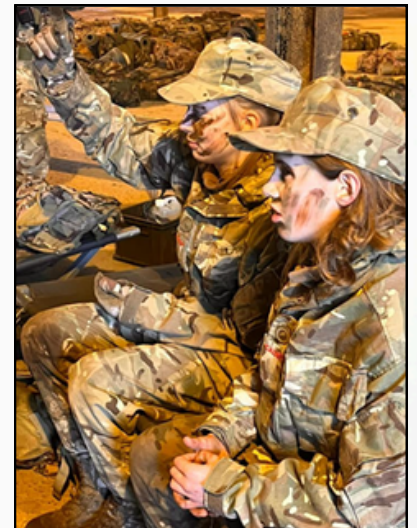
After a fairly dormant winter period the cadets entered the field to put into use some of the skills acquired in the months preceding the trip. Two coaches, two minibuses and a well-laden truck trundled across the Prince of Wales Bridge and made towards Sennybridge training area. Those acquainted with the army will recognise this as the training area for the British Army infantry battle school and it is, in effect, an enormous area of land, punctuated by 'blocks' of woods, 'abandoned' vehicles and some fairly spartan buildings. Ninety cadets and staff were to call this home for the three days of our exercise, using its resources to deliver sessions on a range of topics, as well as to allow the new cadets to use the L98 weapon system (military rifle) for the first time.

After settling in to set up bashers (sleeping arrangements) in the middle of a wooded area or the enormous barn in the centre of our operational area, the cadets set to work; unloading the truck, setting up stands for the following day and preparing the weapons for firings. Later that afternoon, having feasted on the very best that army ration packs can provide, the Year 9 cadets had their first opportunity to see if the weeks of classroom training on the rifle had prepared them for loading, making ready, firing and unloading the weapon - all under the steely gaze of Captain Jones. Surprisingly it went very well and all the cadets were able to get over the initial fear that sometimes accompanies the firing of a rifle for the first time. Once in the swing, there was nothing stopping them and this was good as they were about to test their skills in the rifle whilst being taught to use it as part of a section and as a pair, both 'under fire' from a prepared 'enemy'. This, as you can imagine, was great fun for the cadets and the second day of the exercise allowed them to develop new skills in this area, whilst also learning some first aid, signals, archery, pairs/fire/manoeuvre, observation and an escape room activity. All of these sessions are planned and delivered by senior cadets, building on their own experiences of being taught by past cadets.

The CCF prides itself on the quality of its NCOs and their ability give the younger members of the contingent some great role models and an understanding of the skills required to thrive in the environment



At the end of a very busy day the cadets either observed or participated in an ambush exercise involving three vehicles, twenty 'enemy' and the entire Year 10 cadet cohort as the group lying in wait. The darkness and apparently remote venue added something to the atmosphere and it was very well received by all. The cadets then retired to sleeping bags, having noted the time in the night when they would be expected to go out on patrol around the area. All cadets participated in this and were commended for their commitment over the two nights.



The last morning involved cleaning the weapons in the barn, loading up the coaches and truck before departing for Bath. Stopping en route at the services, the cadets descended on the takeaways and drove off the existing customers. This process was assisted by the fact that unwashed cadets, covered in cam cream and with the dull look of the sleepless, acted as unappealing table partners in a food setting.

Lt Noble and Captain Jones had spent many hours on the planning for the exercise and it was a really exceptional opportunity for the cadets to lead sections, deliver lessons and to begin to use skills which built on the experience from the first exercise in the academic year. The staff were impressed by the commitment and resilience of all the cadets across a very challenging three days. Well done to all.

Under 12 Football

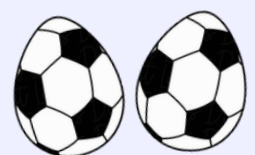

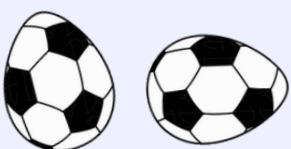

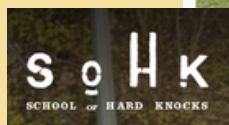

WELLBEING



A solution-focused approach offers a calm and encouraging way to support revision – by focusing on what’s working, building confidence, and taking manageable steps forward.


 **Start with what’s already working**
Before diving into revision plans, take a moment to notice what your child is already doing well. You might say:
“I’ve noticed you got started yesterday – what helped you do that?”
Recognising effort (not just results) builds motivation and confidence.

 **Focus on small, achievable revision goals**
The Easter break can feel long, but exams can also make it feel overwhelming. Help your child break revision into small, realistic steps.
Try asking:
“What’s one topic you feel okay about revising today?”
“What’s a good place to start this morning?”


 **Create a rhythm, not a rigid plan**
Instead of strict timetables, aim for a gentle structure:

- Short bursts of revision (20–40 minutes)
- Regular breaks
- Time to relax and recharge

Ask:
“What kind of routine would work best for you over the holidays?”

 **Notice progress, not perfection**
Revision can bring self-doubt. Help your child focus on improvement rather than getting everything right.

Say:
“You understand more of this than you did last week – what’s helped that?”

 **Keep balance over the holidays**
Easter is still a holiday. Time outdoors, seeing friends, and resting all support better learning.
Ask:
“What helps you feel recharged after revising?”

Supporting Anxious or Neurodiverse Learners

For some young people, exam revision can feel particularly overwhelming. A solution-focused approach is especially helpful here – reducing pressure and increasing a sense of control.

Lower the pressure, raise the support



- Focus on starting, not finishing
- Agree very small steps (even 5–10 minutes)
- Use language like: “Let’s just see what you can do”



Make revision work for them

- Use a variety of approaches: visual aids, audio, movement, mind maps
- Build in regular breaks and predictable routines
- Reduce distractions and create a calm workspace



Notice effort and emotional courage

- Acknowledge how hard it can feel:
“I can see that took effort – well done for sticking with it.”
- Celebrate showing up, not just outcomes



Keep conversations safe and supportive

- Avoid too many questions at once
- Offer choices rather than instructions
- Use scaling questions:
“On a scale of 1–10, how manageable does this feel today?”
“What would move it up by one?”



Prioritise wellbeing

Sleep, nutrition, movement, and downtime are essential – not optional – for learning and memory.



Look ahead with hope

Exams matter, but they are only one part of a much bigger journey. Helping your child feel capable, supported, and hopeful is one of the most valuable things you can do.



Easter takeaway:

Focus on small steps, what’s working, and building confidence. With encouragement, curiosity, and gentle structure, revision can feel far more manageable for every learner.
